One writer says that Archbishop Vaughan seems to entirely forget that the great mass of the British people are Protestants and that they do not wish to see their religion described as false. The writer reminds the Archbishop that the late Cardinal Manning's success in raising Catholics to their present position in England was due to his liberality of thought and true Christian feeling.
