MRS. TAYLOR PRESIDES

Speaker Predicts Prohibition For
Britain

That the trend of the times all over the world is toward temperance is the message brought to London by Miss Isabel McCorkindale, world traveler and Y. W. C. T. U. organizer for Australia. In a short interview with a Free Press reporter, following her address at the regular meeting of the Wright W. C. T. U. at Knox United Church yesterday, Miss McCorkindale thought the temperance situation in Canada a trifle disappointing. She was of the opinion that Government control for liquor gives the cloak of respectability to something which is not respectable. Miss McCorkindale pointed out that there are few dry areas as yet in Australia, but was hopeful that there will be several after the next election. She thought that the condition of Government control existing in many of the provinces in Canada is more dangerous to the temperance cause than the open bar system of her own country. The result of the open bar system will gradually be the undoing of the liquor system of her land, according to this interesting visitor, but she felt that a Government control system cloaks the vices of the situation and thereby dulls the public vision to the need for a remedy.

CONFIDENT.
But Miss McCorkindale was confident that total prohibition, for Canada, but not for Britain as well, is certain. She spoke of the recent decision reached by Lloyd George to throw in his power with that of the prohibition party, and during the stances from her visit to the old country which showed that the public mind of Britain is becoming interested in the temperance question. Because of this interest she urged the women present to work faithfully to maintain restrictive liquor legislation for the Province of Ontario. She affirmed that the eyes of the world in general, and of the British Empire in particular, are directed on the stand taken by this province.

Miss McCorkindale declared that two people of Australia and the people of Canada, standing at the extremes of the British Commonwealth of Nations, should build the bridge of prohibition very securely so that in coming years there will be no disasters through weak bolting or faulty timbers. Miss McCorkindale closed her remarks with a ringing challenge to the mothers that they remove from the pathway of their children any evil which might tempt them into the jungle. "Be not lacking in courage when the fate of your children is at stake," she urged.

Miss McCorkindale was introduced by Mrs. Gordon Wright. Mrs. Percy Taylor, the new president of the Wright W. C. T. U., presided and during the afternoon vocal selections were contributed by Mrs. E. Phillips. Brigadier MacAmmond led the devotional period. The following members were appointed to take charge of departments: Mrs. McKinely and Mrs. James, superintendents of Little White Ribboners; Mrs. Kercher, superintendent of fees; Mrs. Wallace, superintendent of ten temperance. The meeting was very largely attended. Miss McCorkindale will be the speaker at the W. M. S. convention at Wellington Street United Church to-day and at a special meeting at Dundas Center United Church to-morrow night.
