THE Registrar-General has issued new forms of burial permits. An undertaker, clergyman, sexton, householder or other persons engaging in the removal or burial of the dead before the permit has been issued, incurs a penalty of \$20 and costs on conviction. Persons dying of small-pox, scarlet fever, diphtheria or cholera must be buried forthwith by private burial, and transportation of the corpse is forbidden. An effort will be made by the department to prosecute all offenders, as there has been some laxity by the undertakers and others in their observance in the law. It is unlawful and inconvenient for relatives of the deceased to leave the obtaining of the permit to the undertaker, and the practice should be discouraged.

BOSANQUET COUNCIL.
The court of revision on the Willocks drain reduced Hugh Bell's assessment \$2 and reduced \$2 S. Willock's assessment. With these changes the assessments were confirmed.
The court of revision for the Shawana drain reduced Gillis Munroe's assessment \$1 58, struck off W. Sharpe's assessment of \$ 3 77, con. 12, 43, and added these amounts to the township assessment; \$60, the amount allowed for a bridge, was taken pro rata from the land assessments and added to the township assessment and with these changes the assessments were confirmed.

To Provide for Advanced Cases of Tuberculosis.
At the annual meeting of the Lambton Medical Society held in Caldwell's Hall at Watford on February 13th the following resolution was passed.
Moved by Dr. Calder, Petrolia, seconded by Dr. Bradley, Sarnia, that a committee consisting of Drs. Hubbard, Martyn, W. D. Newell, Bentley and the mover wait upon the county council of Lambton at its next meeting, to endeavor to secure adequate appropriation to furnish literature for distribution regarding the care of advanced cases of tuberculosis, and also to provide some place for their maintenance in the county.
The secretary was instructed to ask the local papers to kindly publish this resolution so that any desirous of helping the movement along could do so at present. There is no provision for advanced tubercular cases. Institutions for the treatment of the disease do not want them, and it is through these very cases that the disease is disseminated.
