Toronto Markets. Toronto, Feb. 21.—Except for cattle of extra prime quality live stock prices this extra prime quality live stock prices this morning were practically unchanged at yesterday's declines. Among the dealers a reluctance was manifest to part with their holdings at the reduced prices, and on this account very little business was transacted during the early part of the session. Buyers, however, were firm and by noon nearly the entire offering of 77 cars, containing 1,500 cattle, 600 sheep and lambs, 300 hogs and 160 calves was sold.

The best export cattle sold from \$5.75 to \$6.25 a cwt., medium from \$5.50 to \$6.75, bulls at \$4.60 to \$5.50. The market was weak, only a few transactions

A large portion of the export offering was sold to the local butchers, who in one or two instances paid \$6.25, last week's top level for choice stock. From that down to \$5.75 was paid for good cattle, and for the medium from \$5.25 to \$5.75, with common going at \$4.75 to \$5.25.

Choice butcher cows were a little easier

at \$4,75 to \$5.25, common to medium at \$3.00 to \$4.60 and bulls at \$4 to \$5.50. Canners sold from \$1.50 to \$2.50. Canners sold from \$1.50 to \$2.50.

Choice milkers were quoted at \$60 to \$70, and common to medium at \$30 to \$60. Only a few choice milkers were marketed, and as these were bought up by one man there was no way of testing the market. It is stated, however, that there is plenty of money for properly conditioned stock.

The enquiry for sheep, lambs, and calves was steady. Lambs were quoted at \$5.90 to \$6.25, sheep at \$4.25 to \$4.60 and bucks and culls at \$3.30 to \$3.85.

Hogs, fed and watered, are still selling for \$7.20, and f. o. b. \$6.90. Several sales of hogs, f. o. b., are reported at \$7. On the United States markets this morning a large offering of hogs was sold uning a large offering of hogs was sold united States.
