ON THE BUDGET OF 1912 Speaking in the Legislature on Feb. 16th, 1912, Mr. McCormick

Schools, and declared that children were being sent out for education every day with incompetent teachers to instruct them. He objected to the encroachment of the Legislature on the functions of the municipalities. "We do not leave enough to the Municipal Councils", he said. Mr. McCormick went on, "but the gentlemen opposite adopt our planks as we bring them out"

ON THE BUDGET OF 1914 Mr. McCormick, M. P. P., for East Lambton in the debate in reply to the speech from the Throne in March, 1914, said he had the honor of presenting from his constituency the largest petition ever presented in the Legislature in favor of Tax Reform. Speaking of the necessity of this reform he instanced the old shacks in the best part of the city of Toronto, which were a disgrace to a progressive city like Toronto. The only way to remedy this condition of affairs was to apply the single tax principle to a large city like Toronto which would compel the owners of these shacks to pull them down and erect decent buildings or sell the property to some one who would erect buildings that would draw large rents. The present assessment system was opposed to the progress of any growing city.
