EXPORTING HORSES AND CATTLE.

On the 25th ult., the SS. "Quebec," of the Dominion line, sailed for Liverpool with the finest lot of carriage and draught horses which has ever left Montreal. These horses, 36 in number, are exported by Mr. Spiers, of Toronto, and were purchased for the most part in Ontario, west of Toronto, Mr. Lingham, of Belleville, has also on board 42 splendid head of cattle, which come from Chicago, and two horses from Ontario. The value of these horses is averaged at over \$200 each, several spans of carriage horses costing as much as \$600. The cattle average 1,600 pounds a head, and are in splendid condition. All these valuable horses are housed between decks, and, with the exception of a few animals which have been placed in boxes, are snugly stowed away in Ralph's patent stalls, with their heads turned to the open hatch. Ralph's stall is an English invention, at once inexpensive and efficient; it consists of a frame with paddle sides and ends, against which the horse may bear without suffering the slightest injury during rough weather.
