

WARSHIPS HURRYING TO THE CAPE.

London, Sept. 20.—It is understood that the British fleet is hurrying to the Cape to meet the French fleet.

Sumner was found late this afternoon in his cabinet, looking very pale. It is understood that he will be ill for some time.

Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, the Secretary of State for the Colonies, was present in the building at the same time, and a private conference of the three statesmen took place.

No Excitement Visible. The lack of excitement in official circles is evidence of the deliberate manner in which the crisis is being handled.

More Troops Under Way. London, Sept. 20.—The steamer Jelanga will take 600 troops bound for Natal to-morrow and will embark a rifle brigade on the island of Ceylon for the Cape.

According to a despatch from Durban, Natal, the President of the colony says that the arrival of the troops has created the utmost confidence in the people.

The Royal West Sussex Regiment left today for Malta, and the 1st Battalion of the First Buffs, which goes by the same steamer to Natal.

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AMERICAN MEDIATION IN THE TRANSVAAL.

Bourke Cockran has written an open letter to President McKinley on the subject of mediation in the Transvaal.

"If this government is justified in exerting military force to restore order to the Transvaal, it should exert every moral effort to preserve order at half the distance."

"A recourse to arms, which might result in kindling a fearfully destructive conflagration throughout Christendom, on such questions as those at issue here, is not only unwise but unwarrantable."

"You cannot be indifferent to the fact that when Mr. Chamberlain denounced as indefensible a suggestion of interference by the British government in the purely domestic affairs of the Transvaal, the relations between this country and England were strained over the Venezuelan boundary."

"An Anglo-American Alliance can hardly be a force for the maintenance of justice and the spread of civilization as its avowed policy, marked by English foreign policy, is to seek for a sphere of action for the two countries."
