The Prairie Market. The inactivity noted in the market still continues and sales are of an unimportant character. The complaint is general that there is very little grain coming in, and the bulk of what is here is held at prices above the present views of buyers. Montreal is a little easier in breadstuffs and a slight decline is noted in wheat in Chicago. We quote:

- WHEAT.—No. 1 Fall \$1 40; No. 2 Treadwell \$1 30; \$1 40. BARLEY.—7 1/2c. OATS.—38c. PEAS.—65c. FLOUR.—Superfine \$5 70; \$5 60. SPRING WHEAT.—Extra, \$3 33; \$3 40. FANCY—\$3 55; \$3 75. EXTRA—\$3 85; \$3 90. OATMEAL—\$4 50; \$5 00. CORNMEAL—\$3 15. BUTTER.—Selected lots 18c. to 20c. Choice Dairy 22c. CHEESE.—Cable despatches quote the English market at 86c. Ed. for American Factory, which is a slight decline from late rates. Prices are, nevertheless, firm at 11c. to 11 1/2c. at the factories, according to make. EGGS.—Strictly fresh are wanted, and guaranteed would command from 18c. to 18c., with very few offering. LARD.—Stocks are quite light, and sales are only in a retail way at 10 1/2 to 11c. BACON.—Cumberland cut has again advanced, with sales at 8c. to 9c. There are no sales now, however, under 8 1/2c. at which holders are very firm. HAMS.—There have been some recent receipts of canvassed at a small extent, and these are now selling at 15c. to 15 1/2c. PORK.—No mess on the spot. To arrive sales of broken lots have been made at \$10 50 to \$10 75. WOOL.—The market has been dull and drooping, owing partly to the stringency of the money market, weak holders finding it necessary to sell. Rates are nominally 45c. to 45c., for fleece, and 38c. to 40c. for pulled.
