REQUEST FOR INQUIRY INTO PRICE INCREASE

On the orders of the day:

Mr. Barry Mather (New Westminster): Mr. Speaker, I have a question which I believe should be addressed to the Minister of Justice, but if it should not I am sure he will correct me and redirect it. Can the minister assure the house that the government is taking appropriate measures to study, and if possible to check, the very marked and continuing increase in the price of sugar in Canada?

Hon. Lionel Chevrier (Minister of Justice): Mr. Speaker, I did anticipate this question. The reply is that a study is now proceeding by the director of research in the combines investigation branch of the department. I am informed, however, in a preliminary manner that the question of the increase in the price of sugar in so far as refined sugar is concerned is due in large part to the increase in the price of raw sugar caused, first, by the shortage of crops, and also by the fact that there has been a loss of crops in certain parts of the world from which Canada imports. I am also informed that the increase in the price of refined sugar is proportionate to the increase in the world price of raw sugar. However, when I have a more detailed report I shall be glad to communicate it to the house.
