OERLIKON'S DECISION TO LOCATE IN OUEBEC

Ms. Sheila Copps (Hamilton East): Mr. Speaker, the Prime Minister (Mr. Mulroney) says that the Opposition in the Parliament of Canada has no right to obtain details regarding the Bissonnette-Bazin affair. If he will not listen to the Opposition, perhaps he will listen to Calgary Mayor Ralph Klein and a Calgary city MP who said yesterday, as reported in the Calgary Herald, that they believe political strings may have been pulled in a defence contractor's decision to locate in Quebec.

Klein and Calgary East MP (Mr. Kindy) suspect government intervention may have been involved in the decision to locate a new plant on 100 acres of vacant land near Saint-Jean.

On Monday Kindy said he was aware that the deal was almost struck for Oerlikon to locate in Calgary "but there was some kind of intervention".

Art Smith, past co-chairman of the Calgary Economic Development Authority, said Oerlikon officials told him they got a "better deal on land costs and servicing" from Saint-Jean. "The one thing that Calgary could not offer was a

guarantee that it would get the \$600 million defence contract if it located here", said the Mayor of Calgary.

The people of Canada want explanations, not only on the alleged criminal aspects of this particular affair but on what role the Government of Canada played in the allegations that have now been suggested by the Conservative Member of Parliament for Calgary East.

SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY

LAUNCHING OF LITHOPROBE PROJECT TO STUDY EARTH'S CRUST

Mr. Bill Tupper (Nepean—Carleton): Mr. Speaker, the Minister of State for Science and Technology (Mr. Oberle) and the Minister of State for Forestry and Mines (Mr. Merrithew) together with NSERC have announced a five-year \$25 million research project to investigate, using the latest in high technology equipment, the earth's upper crust. This project, known as Lithoprobe, was five years in the planning and will require extensive field experiments in four regions of the country. Some of Canada's best young scientists in our universities, government, and industry will be involved in one of the largest such projects ever undertaken in Canada. The four regions of experiment are the southern Cordillera in B.C., the Abitibi-Grenville greenstone belt in Quebec and Ontario, the Kapuskasing region in Ontario, and Newfoundland.

The project will concentrate on structural and earth forming processes, but the findings will be of long-term value in leading the way to hidden mineral and oil deposits in Canada, thus ensuring our economic future.

NON-PAYMENT OF TAXES BY HIGH INCOME EARNERS
