## NATIONAL RESEARCH COUNCIL.

Mr. Charles DeBlois (Montmorency—Orléans): Mr. Speaker, I want to congratulate the government for its excellent science and technology policies and its efforts to promote co-operation between the government, the industry and Canadian universities.

The National Research Council's new focused-ion beam facility is a case in point. This laboratory is the only one of its kind in Canada and one of five in North America.

For the NRC, this facility is the key to research on electronic and optoelectronic devices of the year 2000. These devices will be about 100 nanometers, or 100 billionths of a meter, thick, which is 10 times smaller than current equipment.

This new technology is so precise that researchers were able to illustrate its amazing possibilities by drawing on the point of a pin—not the head but the point—no less than 1,711 tiny angels.

This facility is jointly managed by seven agencies: the NRC, Northern Telecom Electronics, Bell Northern Research, the Department of Communications Research Centre, Carleton University and Queen's University.
