Mr. Howden—On Monday next—Proposed Resolution—Resolved, That, in the opinion of this House, the Government should take into immediate consideration steps which would: (a) Provide for periodic medical examination of the Canadian people; (b) Afford medical relief for those suffering from disease.

Mr. McGibbon—On Monday next—Proposed Resolution—That, in the opinion of this House, all outside appointments should be taken away from the Civil Service Commission and made upon the recommendation of the minister.

Mr. Speakman—On Monday next—Proposed Resolution—Whereas; the problem of production has been largely solved, assisted greatly by the application of scientific methods and the results of Organized Technical Research; and

Whereas; the Federal Government has contributed to that end by the establishment of the National Council of Scientific Research, and by the financial

assistance given to that body; and

Whereas; the Problem of Distribution, with the kindred questions of Purchasing Power and the Exchange Values of Agricultural and other Commodities, together with their relation to the growing Problem of Unemployment, are still unsolved, and demand immediate attention with systematized investigation and scientific study; and

Whereas; this can best be done at the instance of the State and by men of scientific training enabled to devote their entire time and attention to the study

of this important subject;

Therefore be it resolved; That, in the opinion of this House, the Government should give immediate consideration to the establishment and maintenance of some organized body for this purpose, which body might be known as the National Council of Social and Economic Research.

- Mr. Cotnam—On Monday next—Proposed Resolution—That, in the opinion of this House, there should be a graded, and general reduction in the salaries of all Government officials, civil servants, etc.
- Mr. Donnelly-On Monday next-Proposed Resolution-That, in the opinion of this House, the price of gasoline to the Canadian consumer has for some time past been too high and that this matter should be referred to the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce to investigate and report.

Mr. Woodsworth—On Monday next—Proposed Resolution—Whereas there exists in Canada an acute economic crisis,

And Whereas the existing economic system is failing to function in the interests of the masses of the people, even denying to large numbers access to the

means of livelihood,

Therefor be it Resolved: That, in the opinion of this House, it is desirable that the present system should be superseded by one based on the principle of co-operative production and distribution in which human needs would be the first consideration.

Mr. Mitchell—On Monday next—Proposed Resolution—Whereas during the session of 1931 a special committee was appointed to investigate the "Beauharnois Power Development" and

Whereas it was shown that enormous sums of money had been contributed

for political campaign funds,

Be it Resolved: That, in the opinion of this House, it is desirable that the Committee on Privileges and Elections consider and report upon the question of election funds and draft such amendments to the Election Act as may be considered necessary.
