Division of the Province.

BY a Proclamation published in the QUEBEC GAZETTE of the 24th. Nour. 1791, the late Province of Quebec was divided into two distinct Provinces-to be called the PROVINCE of UPPER-CANADA, and the PROVINCE of LOWER-CANADA.

THE LINE OF DIVISION

" To commence at a Stone Boundary on the " North Bank of the Lake St. Francis, at ** the Cove West of Pointe au Bodêt, in the Limit bet veen the Township of Lancaster and the Seigneurie of New Longueuil, runoning along the faid Limit in the Direction of North thirty-four Degrees West to the " westermost Angle of the said Seigneurie of New Longueuil, thence along the Northwestern Boundary of the Seigneurie of " Vaudreuil, running North twenty-five " Degrees, East, until it strikes the Otta-" was River, to ascend the said River into " the Lake Tomiscanning, and from the Head " of the faid Lake by a Line drawn due " North until it strikes the boundary Line of " *Eudson's Bay*, including all the Territory " to the Westward and Southward of the " faid Line to the utmost Extent of the " Country commonly called or known by

" the Name of Canada."
