THE SENATE OF CANADA.

BILL A3.

AS PASSED BY THE SENATE 10th MAY, 1911.

An Act for the relief of William Francis Currie.

WHEREAS William Francis Currie, of the city of Toronto, Preamble.
 in the province of Ontario, has by his petition alleged, in
 effect, that on the ninth day of June, A.D. 1909, at the said city of
 Toronto, he was lawfully married to Mary Ethel Floy Dellabough,
 5 that she was then of the said city of Toronto, a spinster; that his
 legal domicile was then and is now in Canada; that on or about
 the twenty-seventh day of December, A.D. 1910, in a stateroom
 in a sleeping car on the line of the Canadian Pacific Railway
 between the said city of Toronto and the city of Detroit, in the
 10 state of Michigan, in the United States, and on the twenty-eighth
 day of December, A.D. 1910, in the hotel Pontchartrain in the
 said city of Detroit, she committed adultery with one W. J.
 Dixon, and previously in the month of April, A.D. 1910, at
 the city of Toronto, in the province of Ontario, she committed
 15 adultery with a man named Pleasant, whose christian name is
 unknown; that he has not connived at nor condoned the said
 adultery; that there has been no collusion directly or indirectly,
 between him and her in the proceedings for divorce; and whereas
 by his petition he has prayed for the passing of an Act dissolving
 20 his said marriage, authorizing him to marry again, and affording
 him such other relief as is deemed meet; and whereas the said
 allegations have been proved, and it is expedient that the prayer
 of his petition be granted: Therefore His Majesty, by and with
 the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of
 25 Canada, enacts as follows:—

1. The said marriage between William Francis Currie, and Marriage
 Mary Ethel Floy Dellabough, his wife, is hereby dissolved, and dissolved.
 shall be henceforth null and void to all intents and purposes
 whatsoever.
