The Cheque above is called a *Marked or Accepted Cheque*, because of "No. A. Mc." written across the left-hand end; the "No." is the page of B. Thompson's A/c in the bank ledger, and "A. Mc." are the ledger keeper's initials; the ledger keeper takes the amount from B. Thompson's A/c and reserves it to pay the cheque. Notice that "Borrow" is crossed out; the word "Order" is understood and need not be written above.
