

CRITICS DREW U-BOATS ACROSS ATLANTIC OCEAN

TWENTY-TWO BRIDGES THROWN OVER MARNE

DEAD BELGIAN SAILOR OWNED LARGE FORTUNE

New York, June 6.—Dork Peter Stinnis, chief engineer, killed when the American steamship A. A. Raven, was torpedoed on March 14 in the English Channel, had \$5200 coming to him in wages and war risk insurance and owned an interest in a Canadian ranch. Officials of the United States shipping board do not know what to do with the money.

DRIVEN ACROSS OISE. French Throw German Detachments

Paris, June 6.—The war office reports: "East of Sempigny, French troops iste yesterday drove back enemy groups which had succeeded in crossing the Oise. The French took 100 prisoners. North of the Aisne the French improved appreciably their positions north and west of Hautegraye. Fifty prisoners remained in our hands. The artillery fighting was heavy, especially in the regions of Longpont and Veuilly-la-Poterie and west of Rheims."

CENSORSHIP TIGHTENS.

Amsterdam, June 6.—Allegations that the German censorship is growing more stringent were made at the opening sitting of the reichstag on Tuesday by Baron von Rechenberg of the Centrist party and Deputy Bauer, a socialist.

BRITAIN NOT TO STARVE.

London, June 6.—John R. Clynes, parliamentary secretary of the ministry of food, told the house of commons today that no efforts of the German submarines, however severe, could menace the civilian population of Great Britain. He said that 457,000 tons of bacon and ham recently had been imported from America.

ALLIED POLICY IN ACCORD.

London, June 6.—"The declaration agreed to at Versailles by the British, French and Italian premiers," says The Daily Chronicle, "bring the defined policy of the Western European powers into harmony with that of the United States on two very important points, namely, concerning Poland and the Czecho-Slovak and Jugoslav necoles."

FATHER FINED FOR HIDING SON
