Gonse for permission to continue the investigation, insisting on the danger of allowing the Dreyfus family to proceed with their investigation alone, the general replied that it was impossible in his opinion and in the opinion of General Boisdefire and the Minister of War to re-open the affair. When I pressed the point in order to make General. Gonse understand that nothing could prevent its re-opening, if it could be believed Dreyfus was innocent, General Gonse replied: 'If you say nothing, nobody will know.'

"General, "I replied firmly, 'what you tell me is abominable. I do not know what I shall do. But I won't carry this secret with me.' [Great sensation.] I at once left the room," added the witness.
