ITALY TO GET TRIPOLI.

Report That the Kaiser, His Arranged the Deal.

Rome, April 13--A fierce agitation is proceeding in Italy against the supposed intention of the government to send an expedition to Tripoli. The agitation is being engineered by the Socialists and Republicans and meetings of protest have been held in most of the large towns.

The majority favors the project, on the assumption that it can be accomplished without much risk, and plenteous of the Italian newspapers vehemently support Tripoli as a matter of fact, the Italian government has practically abandoned the idea of an armed expedition. It now being understood that the object desired may be acquired without violence.

The story goes that the German Emperor, with a view to countering on the Franco-Italian in Italy, promised to use his influence at Constantinople to induce the Sultan to grant Italy a lease of Tripoli, which, of course, is an euphemism for cession; and that Italy is prepared to pay up to 100,000,000 francs to the Sultan. The sovereignty of the Porte would be nominally preserved, but it can be accomplished without much risk, and plenteous of the Italian newspapers vehemently support Tripoli as a matter of fact, the Italian government has practically abandoned the idea of an armed expedition. Cologne, April 13--The Sofia correspondent of The Cologne Gazette telegraphs that M. Sazouf, President of the Macedonian Committee, has issued a proclamation, calling to arms all Macedonians resident in Bulgaria. The proclamation fixes the rising for the Greek Church Easter, on April 27 and 28.

The Macedonians are ordered to report in Sofia and the frontier towns of Bulgaria and to be ready to start prepared to invade Macedonia simultaneously from different points.

Severe Sentences in the Vienna Jockey Club Scandal.

that proposals for peace have been submitted. Immigration takes high flight and invents rosy fictions respecting the Boer surrender and the terms of the British conditions of peace.

The War Office fails to confirm the rumors that the definite proposals have been made from Klerksdorp, and publishes the details of a scheme for sending off twenty thousand reinforcements to Africa. While the air is filled with hopeful conjecture, the Boer chiefs are busy with the question of settling the four big rivers of the Transvaal, and the vanquished have worked out.

Given Them Facility.

The British government has plainly assured the Boer chiefs that every facility for enabling the Boers to return to their homes in the field to confer and to negotiate with the British government will be given them.

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HONORS FOR HON. DR. BORDEN

At Time of Coronation King Will Reward Him for Enthusiastic Service.

BORE BRUNTOF STRUGGLE WITH TARTE

Military Officer in Close Touch With Government House is the Authority.

Ottawa, April 12--A military officer who is in close touch with Government House is authority for the statement that coronation honors are in store for Hon. Dr. Borden. He points out that it is recognized in influential quarters that the Minister of Militia has from the very first taken an enthusiastic interest in Canada's participation in the Imperial struggle in South Africa, and that if he could have had his will there would have been a prompt despatch of 5000 men at Canada's expense soon after the first contingent landed in Cape Town. It is well known that Dr. Borden bore the brunt of the struggle with Mr. Tarte, who opposed the sending of the contingents and only subsided under pressure. All these circumstances are well known to the heads of the War Office, and their appreciation of Dr. Borden's services will be marked in a very significant manner when colonial honors are conferred at the coronation. Whatever distinction comes Dr. Borden's way will meet with the approbation of the Canadian militia.

BRITISH MULES AT LATHROP.

Missouri Farmers Object to Stopping the Sales.

Lathrop, Mo., April 13--It is said here that the order of President Roosevelt to investigate the purchase of horses and mules by the British government will include the supply camp at this place. The farmers during the last year have sold \$7,000,000 worth of horses and thousands of dollars worth of feed and will ask government to prevent the possible stoppage of the trade.

The statement of Major Moore of the British army, in charge of the camp, that the British government has not purchased any horses or mules at Lathrop, but simply inspects the animals being maintained at Lathrop, is refuted by the statement of J. D. D. that despatches of the most momentous character were laid before the cabinet at its meeting Saturday.

The Westminster Gazette says it has received what it terms a well-accredited report to the effect that the Boers are willing to accept the British Empire as junior partners. They will give up their flag and become part of an empire, but will retain their own courts and a constitution practically the same as that of the United States.

BOER TERMS.

Edinburgh, April 12--The Evening News of this city, whose editor is in close touch with Mr. Kruger, declares on the highest authority that the Boers are prepared to accept the following conditions.

"The Boers will make absolute independence a cardinal feature if they can come to a satisfactory agreement as to future internal government."

"The banishment and confiscation of property proclamation must be cancelled and confiscated property restored to its owners, with compensation for private stock and property destroyed or taken by the British."

"Full recognition of state debts contracted before and after hostilities, up to the amount of the national proclamation issued by Lord Roberts."

"The language question is to be mutually agreed upon."

"The release of all political prisoners."

"A date to be fixed when all prisoners of war will be returned to South Africa."

"The effect of one or two friendly powers to be accepted to superintend the carrying out of the terms of the agreement."
