at Present Is to Construct Two Battleships.

Washington Feb. 9. -Though the moneys for the building of only two instead of four battleships urged by President Roosevelt and Secretary of a reavy deficit and the prospect of deyear have been held up as a warning by Chairman Towney, of the appropriations committee, and a general tendency on the part of the Republicans in the House to hold down expenses, is evident.

The naval committee feel that it is wiser to trim and prune in the committhe expenditure which probably would be voted down on the floor. It is likely however, that the committee will re commend an appropriation to cover the reception into the navy of at least 3,300 of the additional 6,000 men asked for by the secretary of the navy, to man the new battleships New Hampshire, Idaho and Mississippi, and the new armored cruisers North Carolina and Mintana, soon to go into commission. The navy is now 600 men short of its quota.
