

Assessment Commissioner Stephen Grant would not hazard a guess on the probable amount on which the Government would colect its income. "You see our figures are no criterion to go by." he said. "We collect on single men on incomes over \$1,500." "The Government's minimum is \$3,000 and \$4,000. A large proportion of the men from whom we collect do not get either \$3,000 or \$4,000, so we cannot say. However, there are large incomes in London that are not touched in a way by us. Dividends from industries, etc., are exempt, so we cannot get any information on these sums."


