BRITISH SUBMARINES SUNK 325 GERMAN SHIPS DURING WAR

Heavy Toll of Enemy Warships, Transports and Submarines by Undersea Branch of "Silent Navy" - One Commander Crui sed 22,000 Miles.

LONDON, Nov. 16.—(Saturday).—(By
British Wireless Service).—Details can at sight. Care was taken to see that the crews of all vessels got safely

British Wireless Service).—Details can now be given of the part which British submarines played during the war. This service destroyed the following enemy warships: Two battleships, two armed cruisers, two light cruisers, seven destroyers, five gunboats, twenty submarines and five armed auxiliary vessels.

One submarine three battleships and one light cruiser were tyrpedoed, but reached port badly damaged.
