Welfare Committee Extended Aid to Man Landing Without Funds.

London's branch of the soldiers' aid commission concluded a busy month on August 31, according to the report issued by Secretary E. H. Lance this morning. There were 830 visits made to the office by soldiers or their depend-ents for information and assistance, and the number of London men included in that total was 562. In the employment section, 163 men applied for positions, and work was obtained for 72 of them. The remainder were referred to the Ontario Government Employment Bureau and the department of soldiers' civil

Advances Made.

The report states that there were 60 advances made, amounting to \$3,177.75, during August by the finance committee under the direction of Chairman George F. Copeland. A radical revision in the assessment of London property may be made next year. Mayor C. R. Somerville and Ald. E. S. Little have been appointed a special committee to investigate the matter with Assessment Commissioner Stephen Grant.
