

The Farmers' Association was formed after the Patrons died out. It had political influence, which was felt frequently on the side of reform. In 1906, it was instrumental in bringing to a head a debate on the wisdom of appointing a railway commission, which was to regulate freight and passenger rates. Then, working with the farmers' and fruit growers, it laid before the commission such information as to bring about a re-adjustment of the freight rates, which saved the farmers and fruit growers thousands of dollars a year. In the same year, the Canadian Manufacturers' Association began to agitate for a tariff. This was opposed so strongly by the Farmers' Association and "The Grange" that the manufacturers changed their tactics and sought to lower the tariff instead of raise it. Later, the latter unions united, forming one body and soon a wider movement than ever was started in the United Farmers'.


