



I have had a delightful time in Eng- land, and especially in the old home of my father in Ireland, where they were as proud of my success as if it had been won by one of them. I shall never forget the treatment accorded to me." Hayes added a little more to this statement when he landed, by saying: "I have nokick coming. The English press was the source of all the trouble.
