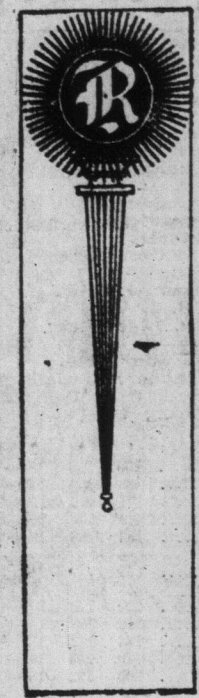

A Wild West Tragedy.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 26.—At Gulfport, Mississippi, a cowboy named Leon Seely, belonging to a Wildwest Show, rode into a crowd of negroes, beating them over the heads with a revolver. Policemen Varnadoe started in pursuit of Seely and the two men were lost to view in a cloud of dust. Later their bodies were found, each bearing a single bullet wound and each man's revolver containing one empty chamber.

THE CHURCH TO BLAME.

Rev. Dr. Carman Discusses the Political Situation.

Addressing the Methodist Ministerial Association yesterday, Rev. Dr. Carman said that the political atmosphere was reeking with the stench of slander, and men in high places were debauching the young men of Canada by the recklessness with which the standards of political and social morality were being lowered.

He did not think the ministers of the Methodist Church had been true to their duty, for to-day the result of their disinterestedness was being seen in the wilful slandering and grafting. It was the duty of the church to educate the electorate up to the point of demanding a better class of representative, and he lamented the fact that some of the men in political life had sunk to a low level instead of rising superior to the occasion and becoming statesmen.

So far as "The Higher Criticism," a topic introduced by Rev. George Jackson, was concerned, Rev. Dr. Carman expressed the opinion that when the matter had been limited to certain well-defined limits it might be discussed with profit, but he could see no benefit, and he proceeded to deal with it from the standpoint of supernaturalism and inspiration. He told the many ministers present that the field was too vast.

BROCKVILLE, Ont., Oct. 26.—(Special.)—The courts at Ogdensburg have just discharged six Chinamen who have been in jail for several weeks on a charge of entering the United States illegally. It was presumed they had been smuggled across the river from Brockville, as they were caught on Uncle Sam's territory shortly after making the landing on a dark night. They have proved their citizenship.
