JUNCTION MAYORALTY CANDIDATE RETIRES

Mr. Wright Will Again Be in the Field for Council—Paving Well Completed—Items.

TORONTO JUNCTION, Dec. 3.—R. G. Agnew who has charge of the re-election of the Junction voters, has in the interests of the Conservative party already secured over 1200 additional names to the present list for 1907. Residents of the town whose names do not appear and who are eligible to vote should appear to have their names on the list as soon as possible.

Magistrate Is Patient.
In police court to-day Magistrate Ellis listened to an amusing assault case. The plaintiff, named Macwooko and the defendant George Cosac are both Poles, and not conversant with the intricacies of the English language, consequently the evidence had to be given thru interpreters who on being questioned as to their veracity when the evidence became exceptionally entangled declared "We are Jews and won't tell lies."

About a week ago Macwooko came to the police station with a cut in his head. After the injury had been dressed by Dr. Hopkins he was locked up for the night in the police station, and next day laid the charge of assault against Cosac. After listening to the different harangues till about 1 p.m., Police Magistrate Ellis decided that the evidence was "full of sound and fury signifying nothing," and dismissed the case.

A boy named Michael Conron was charged with trespassing on railway property by jumping on and off trains at the C. P. R. station. He was fined \$1 without costs.

A man named Longhurst was fined \$2 and costs for assaulting Alexander Evans of St. Clair-avenue.

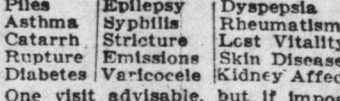
