

Happenings in the World of Sport Brightly Told Of

LESLIE BOYD EXPLAINS WHY HE ENTERED PROTEST

He Gives His Reason for Objecting to Tom Longboat's Participation in the Marathon Race--Foran to Leave Federation.

Montreal, Aug. 27.—Reasons leading up to his protest of the Indian runner Longboat on behalf of the Federation just before the Marathon race at London were for the first time made public Tuesday night at a meeting of the board of directors of the body which Mr. Leslie H. Boyd, K.C., represented at the Olympic committee. Mr. Boyd went into full details of the circumstances which prompted his action, and on the conclusion of his report the Federation passed unanimously a resolution endorsing what he had said.

The public has been considerably misled by press statements, said Mr. Boyd, that the protest was directed at the Olympic committee by the Canadian committee. The committee did not send me over and when I went over I carried in my pocket the authority of the Federation to act as I deemed advisable in the interest of that body. As to the reported criticisms of my constantly assenting myself from the Canadian team, they are absolutely false. I have only to refer to the Montreal members of the team who will bear me out in this respect.

Section 4—For this purpose we delegate that each body should appoint delegates to act as a central council with the representative in Canada of the British Olympic Committee.

Section 5—Each body maintains its own amateur definition, but in order to reach a basis of co-operation it is agreed that as regards any question of amateur status a decision as to the eligibility of the Canadian Olympic games shall be left to the Canadian committee.

Section 6—The objection of the C.A.A.U. officials to sit on the same board with Messrs. O'Connell and Foran and the Federation's refusal to name other representatives. Finally at one of the sessions of the Central Olympic committee an amendment was passed striking out of clause 4 of the agreement, and also that section 7 be amended so as to eliminate the reference therein to the dual representation of the Federation and the C.A.A.U., leaving the whole question of the enlargement of the committee in the hands of the Central Committee.

Section 7—Each body maintains its own amateur definition, but in order to reach a basis of co-operation it is agreed that as regards any question of amateur status a decision as to the eligibility of the Canadian Olympic games shall be left to the Canadian committee.
