Plans Shake-up In Street Dept.

Commissioner of Public Works Reinstates Mr. Winchester But Will Reorganize His Staff in Near Future

Albert Winchester, the suspended superintendent of streets, will resume his duties this morning. A statement to this effect was made yesterday afternoon by Commissioner G. Fred Fisher of the department of public works, at the regular council meeting yesterday afternoon. Commissioner Fisher said that he had in mind the re-organization of the street department, and pending the completion of his plans, Mr. Winchester would resume his work. This statement, the commissioner added, would show that he had no intention to disregard any action of the council. As to what position Mr. Winchester would be recommended for Thursday, when the complete plans will be submitted to the council, Commissioner Fisher would not say.

In addition to transacting the scheduled business of the meeting the council received and passed the annual reports of the commissioner of public works and of the city engineer. In order that the city engineers on the wharves might work out a full week's business of being laid off between pay days if the previous arrangement was continued, Mr. Winchester was asked that their time expire tonight. The council acquiesced.

The committee of the whole recommended that the controller be authorized to certify for payment of a salary of \$800 per month; it also recommended the passage of the resolution submitted by Commissioner Fisher regarding the business restriction by-law. The report was passed in its entirety.

Commissioner Fisher moved that Miss B. Cliff, city hall stenographer, be remunerated at the discretion of the mayor for her services in taking and transmitting evidence at the Carvell hearing last fall, and that the Winchester investigation be a short time ago. This motion was carried by a majority of 10 to 4.

Commissioner Fisher reported that by clause in the contract with Corey & Stephens for the pasting of the 16th of Main street, the road engineer was prevented from accepting the work as completed at a later date than the 16th of November last, or between November 16 and May 1 next, thus holding up payment to the contractor.

The road engineer reported that the work was completed November 24, and that the contractors were not to blame for the delay, and recommended that the work of the work. The commissioner recommended that the city accept completion of the work under the contract as recommended by the said road engineer.

He also reported the mechanical foreman of the department, Frank Goodwin, recommended the purchase of certain repair parts for the two department trucks at an estimated cost of \$187. The parts were ordered through the city engineer, but the estimate proved to be too low, the invoice price amounting to \$248.64.

As the parts were needed and the account is correct, he asked that it be paid, a request that also received passage.

Commissioner Fisher also took up the case of John Mullin regarding loss of employment as caretaker of the public squares, and recommended that no action be taken, as Mr. Mullin was not an employee of the council.

His final recommendation was that the request of Cheyne & Company for permission to erect an electric sign over the sidewalk in front of their store, No. 166 Union street, be granted under the usual conditions and upon their executing a proper agreement. It was granted.

Would Take Over Street Railway

Strongly disapproving the agreements existing between the city and the St. John Railway Company for the upkeep and maintenance of the streets, Commissioner G. Fred Fisher, of the public works department, advocated the acquisition of the property by the city of St. John at its annual report, which was submitted to the common council yesterday afternoon. The commissioner also drew attention to the fact that the possibility of a law suit between the city and the company to recover payment for work amounting to \$100,000, to have been done on the street railway tracks in Main street. It was brought out in the report that the legislation looked after the interests of the city better in its dealings with the company than the city itself.

TRAVELING AGENT FOR TOURIST WORK

New Brunswick may have a tourist agent next season to travel abroad and interest those who seek summer resorts in other parts of Canada and the United States in the beauties and summer attractions in this province. The matter was discussed at some length last night at the meeting of the Tourist Association held in the board of trade rooms. The consensus of opinion was that a permanent tourist traveler employed by the St. John Tourist Association could accomplish much to boom the tourist traffic in the summer season. The matter was finally left in the hands of a committee composed of E. A. Schofield, N. B. Desbriay and F. A. Dykeman, to look further into the suggestion and see if it was not possible to secure the service of some competent man who would give his whole time to the work. A general discussion followed regarding ways and means of furthering the interests of the tourist traffic of the province and the distribution of literature.

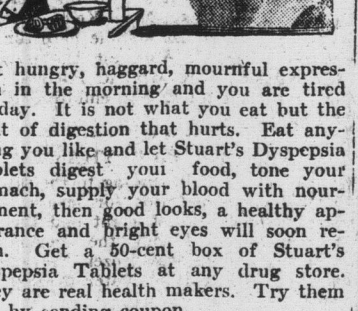

SERBIA'S SUFFERING

Refugees Tell of Flight From the Teuton Invaders

War is no new thing to Serbia. For centuries she has had to battle to hold her own. But until this last war, most of the physical suffering has been on the field of action—the non-combatants bearing their burden in their homes.

To look on Serbia in former wars, and then to have seen her plunge into action against those in this conflict in whom she saw the greatest of all menaces to her liberty is to admire her gallant spirit, her ancient patriotism, her glorious sacrifices.

For it is not only the men who are suffering in this war. What the women, children and the aged men have gone through is beyond description, thousands having succumbed to the rigors of winter, typhus and other diseases, starvation, and the brutality of the Teuton hordes.

A letter from Madame Losettich, wife of a professor in the University of Belgrade, a woman over sixty years old, describes the suffering in the flight over the mountains.

"These are the darkest days of our life, and I wonder why we still have hope, and where we expect it can come from—for two months we have been groping blindly from place to place, we had started but we did not know for what destination. The first night we passed on a veranda. Of course it was bitterly cold, and there was no sleep as we had no blankets. The next morning, very early while the moon was still shining, I had to go to a little brook to wash before we started. We were walking now, climbing Mount Tehekar (6,000 feet). The way was covered with snow. We staggered into the first doorway, and I found there were only two benches in the room, it seemed Heaven.
