**Leafs Finish Training**

Petersburg, Va., April 13.—The Leafs finished their training here yesterday. Richmond played here this afternoon and were lucky to win by 5 to 4. Manager Lajoie cast a critical eye over the Richmond team and concluded that their own was just as good or better.

The Leafs played in Norfolk this afternoon. Two of the new players, Jacobson and Lynch, will join the team at Baltimore on Monday. Another of the recruit pitchers, Labate, was released outright by Lajoie. He failed to convince the manager that he would ever make a pitcher. The Richmond club announces that Saturday, April 21, will be Lajoie day in that city.

**Royals New Pitchers**

Jersey City, April 13.—Unless unforeseen happenings occur within the next few days, the Royals will hear the rumors on Monday night for Providence, R.I., with a badly crippled team. During the last week the Royals' leader has camped on the trail of several big league managers in an endeavor to land four new pitchers and a short stop, but his efforts have been futile. **Etawah's Great Performance**

As the merits of trotting horses come to be measured more and more by the racing capacity as distinguished from records made against time, the performance of the four-year-old colt Etawah, 208, in trotting three consecutive winning heats in 2:03 3/4, 2:03 1/2, in a race at Lexington, Ky., in the fall of 1914, appeals to horsemen with greater force as the years go by. Nearly a score of horses have beaten the time of the fastest heat in this race, but none has yet equalled Etawah's time for three heats, and it takes three heats to win the money at most meetings nowadays. The holder of this record is a bay stallion, not quite 15 hands high, and is bred in lines from which early and extreme speed would be expected, rather than staying capacity. His sire, Al Stanley, 2:08 1/4, was a son of Todd, 2:14 3/4, by Bingen, 2:08 1/4, and his dam, Alicia Aron, was by Arion, 2:07 1/4, son of Electioneer, the grand sire of Bingen. Etawah is now in the stud at David M. Look's Castleton Farm, near Lexington, Ky. He is one of the best formed little horses of his breed, and as he was one of the greatest racehorses as well, with almost faultless action and a level head, many experts believe he will prove to be one of the greatest of sires.

**Death of Notable Sires**

By the recent death of William the Third and Marcovill, British racing interests have lost two notable sires, at the outset of the breeding season. William the Third died the property of his breeder, the Duke of Portland. He was a son of St. Simon and Gravity, by Wisdom and was foaled in 1898. Though he won none of the classics for three-year-olds he had to his credit as a four-year-old the Ascot Gold Cup, the Doncaster Cup and the Alexandra Plate, and he went to the stud with the reputation of being a stayer. His success there was in getting a large number of good winners rather than a few great ones. He never led the list of winning sires, but the aggregate earnings of his off-spring during the last ten years were exceeded by very few horses.
