THE SCHOOLS

Contract For Bentley Street
Structure

Cost to be \$71,354.40—Matter of
Water Taxes—Government
Authorization of Debitures

The new school in Bentley street is now under way. Tenders were opened last night at the meeting of the school board and the awards were made. Letters were read from the government authorizing the board to issue debentures to the amount of \$75,000 to carry on the work and a copy of the order-in-council, containing this authorization, was enclosed with these letters.

After the usual routine business had been concluded, the board went into the matter of the new school. Architect Brodie was in attendance and the whole project was considered. The estimate had been placed at \$70,000. The tenders, as accepted, exceed this amount by \$1,354.40. It is planned to have the work started at once, so as to have the roof on by Christmas, but it is not expected that the new building will be ready for occupancy until the opening of the term after the summer holidays of next year. The tenders as awarded last night are as follows:

Masonry—B. Mooney & Sons, \$80,000.00; carpentry, E. Bates, \$18,775.00; plumbing and heating, G. & E. Blake, \$7,700.00; painting and glazing, Jas. H. Pullen, \$2,800.00; electrical work, H. Webb & Son, \$1,011.40; vacuum plant, H. Webb & Son, \$1,498.00. Total, \$118,884.40.

retary Dickson, enclosed a copy of the order-in-council authorizing the board to issue the necessary bonds.

A communication from the St. John street railway, with respect to certain arms and wires on school buildings, was read and accepted.

Bolton in Schools.

A communication from the General Accident Insurance Company, of Toronto, gave details of inspections made of the boilers in the King Edward and Winter street schools. One of the boilers in the former building was found to be in a bad state, and certain repairs were needed for a boiler in the Winter street building. The communications were referred to the visitors committee.

The matter of the radiators in the King Edward school was brought up by Dr. Manning. Five hundred feet must be replaced, he said, before the heat could be turned on and, as the cold weather is now at hand, the matter must be attended to at once. Owing to the illness of chairman Coll of the building committee, the matter had been allowed to stand until the present. The visitors committee for the school, was authorized by the board, to have the necessary work done at the lowest cost compatible with good work.

The matter of increased assessment for school purposes was brought before the board by Dr. Manning.

Chairman Emerson agreed that the matter should be dealt with in the near future, adding that he had not lost sight of its importance.

The report of the building committee, which met on August 30, with respect to the new Bentley street school, was read. The report said that plans had been submitted by F. Neil Brodie and had been adopted and that tenders had been called for to close on September 11. The report was adopted.

Water Rates.

The question of water rates to the public schools came before the board, through the secretary calling attention to some remarkable increases in the water bills. In several cases this increase was double, and in others triple what it had been ordinarily.

Chairman Emerson said that he failed to see why the schools should be called upon to pay any water tax at all.

Dr. Manning said that he could not see the wisdom of the citizens thus taxing themselves. They might just as well tax the fire department or the city water cars because they use water. All are public utilities. The people are simply taxing themselves, and the money is coming back for water.

A motion was made that the water be turned off in all the buildings at 4:30 o'clock each afternoon and remain turned off from Friday until Monday. The wisdom of this was questioned, it being stated that in the case of the Albert school there was every probability

that, were this done, the pipes would be frozen solid during the winter.

Dr. Bridges expressed the opinion that taxing the schools for their water supply is a very short-sighted policy.

The matter was allowed to lie on the table and he then resolved itself into a committee to consider the tenders for the new Bentley street school which had closed yesterday.

**BIG PLANS FOR THE
MERCHANTS' RALLY
HERE NEXT WEEK**

The committees in charge of the big commercial rally of New Brunswick Retail Merchants to be held in St. John under the auspices of the Retail Merchants' Association next week, Sept. 19 and 20, are all very busy working out plans for the rally. From all reports coming to hand, a big delegation is expected from all parts of New Brunswick, as the Canadian Pacific and the Government Railways have granted the reduced rate under the standard certificate plan, namely, one-way first-class ticket, which can be purchased from the 10th to the 20th, and returning, tickets to be obtained up to the 28th inclusive.

The provincial secretary, Robert Reed, has written up a twenty-page booklet which contains the official programme, and information regarding the work of the association. The programme and entertainment committees have worked hand in hand to allow for work and recreation.

Tuesday morning is given for registration and Reception of delegates. That afternoon the president, Alex. Murray, will extend to visiting merchants words of welcome on behalf of the provincial association, to be followed by Mayor Hayes, giving the city's welcome. Joseph Likely, president of the board of trade, and A. O. Skinner, president of the local branch of the R. M. A., will extend words of welcome on behalf of their associations. An address will then be given on the Retail Merchants' Association, its benefits, etc., by A. O. Skinner.

Tuesday evening the merchants and their ladies will be entertained by a visit to the Imperial Theatre, Manager Golding is working up a special programme for the R. M. A. Wednesday morning will be a get-together conference of wholesalers and retailers. F. W. Roach, president of the Canadian Credit Merchants' Trust Association, Ltd., and A. H. Wetmore, president of the Wholesale Grocers' Guild, will both address this session of the rally, which will be followed by discussion on addresses.

Wednesday afternoon the merchants and their ladies will be guests of the city, through the kindness of Commissioner J. V. Russell, and a sail to points of interest around the harbor has been arranged for on the steamer Ludlow. On their return a spectacular feature of the rally will take place when a grand parade of retail vehicles, automobiles and teams will be reviewed. A prize will be offered—three years' membership in St. John branch of the R. M. A.—for the best slogan relating to the Retail Merchants' Association. Three judges will be appointed from the visiting merchants. All vehicles in the parade must be decorated with a slogan.

On Wednesday night the rally will close with a complimentary banquet to be given by the St. John branch of the R. M. A. A. O. Skinner will preside,
