Junior Red Cross Members In Province Now Are 8,060

At the end of November there were 8,060 Junior Red Cross members enrolled in New Brunswick or 10.1 per cent of the total school population, and this Junior organization had been established in 928 of the classrooms, which is 14.8 per cent of the total number of classrooms. Some idea of the great increase in Junior Red Cross activity during the present year is gained from the fact that on Dec. 31, 1925, there were 214 branches and 5,831 members. All of these branches are active, most of them exceedingly active and every branch is carrying out the Junior program in connection with the school work and each member is keeping the health rules.

These facts were contained in a report of the Junior Red Cross work in New Brunswick submitted by Miss Jessie I. Lawson, supervisor, for the meeting of the General Council of the Red Cross and the Dominion Junior Red Cross committee which met in Toronto this week. The report tells of Miss Lawson's own work in the last three months, during which she has prepared four issues of the New Brunswick Junior Red Cross News Letter, written three articles for the Educational Review and written 215 letters, besides travelling 3,859 miles, 1,292 miles being by motor, visiting 116 schools and giving 189 addresses to 69 Junior branches, to 47 schools where Junior work was being organized, to four senior branches, to three Rotary Clubs, to 14 Women's Institutes and five community meetings. In addition, she made investigations concerning more than 50 cases of handicapped children.
