JOSEPH NAVES IN COURT ON BIGAMY CHARGE

Wife Alleges He Married Few Months Ago As Cosman

SECOND WIFE NOT AT COURT SESSION

First Says She Knew He Was Using Name of Cosman

The marital tangles of Joseph Naves, otherwise known as Kenneth Albert Cosman, were the basis of a domestic drama in the Saint John Police Court this morning. Naves was charged with bigamy by his wife, formerly Miss Rebecca Scott, 266 Prince Edward street. Mrs. Naves said she was deserted by her husband about 10 months ago, and other witnesses testified that he had gone through a marriage ceremony with Miss Elsie Muriel Speight in January.

Wife number two was not in court. Court officials said that they had been informed that she had left town. Rapid progress was made with the case and the evidence was completed when the court adjourned except for the evidence of one witness which was taken at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning when it is expected that the preliminary hearing will be concluded.

Naves was in court on a former occasion on a charge of assault preferred by his wife. She testified this morning that as a result of the assault her hearing had been impaired.

WED 3 YEARS AGO.
Mrs. Rebecca Naves, wife number one, told of marrying the accused about three years ago. Rev. A. L. Tedford officiated. She produced a marriage certificate which was placed in evidence. They had one child two years old, she said. They lived together until about 10 months ago when accused went west on a business excursion. She said she had not seen him again until Christmas day.

KNOW OF OTHER NAME.
Cross-examined by E. J. Henneberry, she said that she had gone to Bathurst and lived there for several months, after her husband left her. She said she had heard that he was living in the name of Kenneth Albert Cosman.

Miss Dorothy Speight said that she knew the accused as Kenneth Cosman and by no other name. She had been present at a marriage ceremony between him and her sister, Elsie Muriel Speight. Accused and his sister lived at a house in Paradise row. The ceremony took place about two months ago.
