Hon. C. Stewart Announces Bill to Encourage Industry

Will be Introduced at Ottawa -Money for N. B. Buildings in Estimates

of works for the production of coke from coal mined in Canada is to be brought down in the House by Hon. Charles Stewart, Minister of the Interior, a despatch from Ottawa this morning said. The assistance given is not to exceed three per cent. of the cost of the work.

LOCAL PROJECT

It will be recalled that when S. E. Elkin was in the city a short time ago he said the erection of the coke plant here was waiting for this legislation to be enacted and the word that it will be before Parliament now is expected to have the effect of encouraging the promoters of the project to go ahead with the work of erecting the necessary buildings for this plant. It has been said that the site of the coke plant would be the area now occupied by the buildings of the Maritime Nail Co. and that in addition to several new buildings there would be a large wharf structure built to give a berth on the harbor line.

Another Ottawa despatch this morning says that among the estimates passed for public buildings there was included \$124,000 for New Brunswick; \$5,000 for Prince Edward Island; \$82,500 for Nova Scotia; \$274,000 for Quebec and \$515,397 for Ontario.

Other estimates passed included \$43,000 for repairs to públic buildings in the Maritimes; \$865,000 for miscellaneous expenses of the department of the Public Works for architectural, engineers and national monument work, gineers and national monument work and \$212,770 for grading, docks, lock and dams throughout the Dominion.



Eight Miles of Piping and 1,459 Sprinklers Installed as Protection Against Fire.

For the last two months, eight workmen, an engineer and architect, all employed by the Automatic Sprinkler system of Canada, with head offices in Montreal, have been busily working on the installation of automatic fire protectors, in the form of water sprinklers, in the Royal Hotel. Some 1,459 sprinklers and eight miles of pipe have been installed in this hostelry, and, besides decreasing the fire risk to a great extent, this has also been the cause of the Royal's fire insurance premiums being reduced 67 per cent. The entire cost of the whole work amounted to \$20,000.
