GEO. E. MCINTOSH NAMED FRUIT COMMISSIONER OF DOMINION

Geo. E. McIntosh, who has been acting fruit commissioner since the resignation of C. W. Baxter, has been appointed fruit commissioner of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa. Following several years of journalism, Mr. McIntosh has become intimately acquainted with the conditions surrounding the marketing of fruit, as well as the transportation of fruit both within and beyond the province. He was engaged in this work from 1911 up to 1917, when he was appointed transportation specialist in the federal fruit branch, which position he has been holding up to the taking over of the present position. As transportation specialist, Mr. McIntosh has become intimately acquainted with the marketing problems of the various provinces and districts.

CLAIM WORLD AUTO RECORD.

**Germans Assert They Broke Non-Stop Endurance Record.**  
Berlin, Sept. 12.—The world's non-stop and endurance record was claimed here for two German automobiles, which completed a 300-hour run on the Avus course in this city. The only day interruptions permitted for eight tire changes and one short pause to drain off water which had collected in the benzine tank during a rainstorm.

The two machines had an average speed forty-five kilometers, which at some periods reached eighty. The distance traveled was 13,500 kilometers, equivalent to the mileage between Berlin and Tokyo. Each machine carried four chauffeurs, who worked in five-hour shifts during the twelve and one-half day's run. The drivers included a count and the manager of the factory where the machines were built.

The first puncture occurred after 8,000 kilometers. One machine used 412 gallons of gasoline and the other 450.

ON MOTOR TRIP.

RAT FIGHTS LITTLE GIRL FOR CRACKERS

Rodent Tears Stocking Before Spectator Kills Six Others Found Where Children Play.

Emboldened by hunger, a huge rat, one of a number seen recently just outside of Bronx Park, New York, attacked a little girl playing with other children and tore away a piece of one stocking before an onlooker clutched the animal by its tail and dashed it to death on the sidewalk.

The child screamed. Albert Seixas was leaving his home across the street. He ran over and grabbed the rodent by the tail. Seixas swung the rat to the sidewalk, killing it.

KILLED THREE

Enraged Man Ran Amuck With Shotgun.

York, S. C., Sept. 12.—Three are dead and three more are wounded in the running amuck of William C. Paris, a textile worker at Clover, ten miles north of here.

Paris, infuriated over quarrels said to have occurred between his children and the Taylor family, grabbed a shotgun loaded with buckshot and instantly killed Claude Johnson, twenty-one, a cousin of the Taylors, Lela Taylor, sixteen, and Newton Taylor, thirteen, died later in a hospital at Gastonia, N. C., from the wounds received, according to the authorities.

Miss Gertrude Taylor, eighteen, is wounded and is not expected to live. Fred Taylor, twenty-one and Dollie Taylor, nine, are also seriously wounded.

Police Officers R. E. Steele took Paris to the penitentiary at Columbia late last night. Paris will be held there for safekeeping, trouble being feared if he be left here. The trip was made through the country.

Criminal court convenes here Monday.

TESTS FOR POLICE DOGS.

Training Competition to Feature Bench Show.

A training competition for police dogs will be held at Montreal on October 13 and 14 in conjunction with a bench show under C. K. C. rules, for shepherd dogs only.

The following will be the tests: To guard an article and to defend the same against any one attempting to remove it. To remain in the place where his master ordered him to stay, even if shown a cat, chicken, rabbit or food.

To find a master, to follow a trail and find a concealed person. Attack and defend by command, to defend his master even without command if the same should be threatened, to go after a fugitive, hold him securely and remain indifferent to revolver shots or a beating with a club.

CHEAPER DUST LAYING.

Calcium Chloride Being Laid on Prince of Wales Highway.

Brookville, Sept. 12.—Calcium chloride, a chemical substance, laid in powder form, is being applied to stretches of the Prince of Wales Highway between here and Ottawa to lay the dust. The experiment is being carried out by the Department of Highways with a view to determining the relative values of the chemical and of oil for this purpose, and also stretches of roadway, at Spencerville and Manolick respectively, are being treated. The chemical absorbs and retains moisture and forms a coating over the surface of the road. Its cheapness as opposed to an oil treatment is said to be considerable and as both treatments have to be repeated frequently by the department hopes to effect a material saving.

ILLITERACY IN CUBA

Said To Be Increasing Among Whites and Blacks.

Havana, Cuba, Sept. 12.—Illiteracy among white Cubans between the ages of ten and fourteen years has increased 15.5 per cent. between 1907 and 1919, and among blacks, 22.5 per cent., according to an analysis by Diario De La Marina, of data contained in the 1919 Cuban census, which has just been made public. The paper points out that this increase in illiteracy occurred while Cuba enjoyed self-government, and declares that it indicates a "fundamental crash" failure of the Cuban school system.

SAYS WOOD ALCOHOL HAS NO ANTIDOTE

New York, Sept. 12.—Dr. Alexander O. Gettler, pathological chemist and toxicologist of the medical examiner's staff, and professor of chemistry of New York University, gives this warning to the public:

"Don't drink wood alcohol. There is no antidote. There is sufficient poison in one drink of wood alcohol to kill many persons. Absorption in the human system is quick and fatal. By the time the doctor has been summoned the deadly poison has been absorbed in the system. 'The only remedy is, don't drink it.'"

INVITATION TO A SYDNEY, N. S. RECTOR

Rev. C. R. Cumming, rector of Christ Church, Sydney, C. B., has been invited to consider a call to the rectory of Holy Trinity Parish, Bridgewater.

The rectorship will become vacant next November when the present incumbent will go to the United States. Rev. Mr. Cumming was rector of Holy Trinity for five years, before going overseas as chaplain in 1916. He has been rector of Christ Church since 1919.

CHINESE CHILDREN STAGE SCHOOL STRIKE

Victoria, B. C., Sept. 12.—Chinese school children are on strike, refusing to attend classes and girls mingled with whites in schools here, but white parents protested against such an arrangement, and the school board decided to separate the Orientals. A special school was built for the Chinese, but they refuse to enter it.

SKEPTICAL EXPERT.

Glasgow, Sept. 12.—Doct. often fail to diagnose correctly lung consumption as distinct from other respiratory diseases, according to Professor Erist of Paris, in a recent address before the British Medical Association.

The speaker said that in 1916 at Compiegne 192 men were sent into hospital with a diagnosis of tuberculosis. Observations showed the diagnosis to be justified in only fifty-three cases. The 139 other cases, he declared, were undoubtedly non-consumptive.

In 1918, Dr. Erist examined 342 men in Paris said to have consumption. Of

CURED OF DEAFNESS

ON A LOFTY FLIGHT

Chicago, Sept. 12.—(By Canadian Press)—Fifteen thousand feet up in the air A. S. Harris, a former soldier, pronounced himself cured of deafness by army and other specialists, regained his hearing. Before the airplane flight he was unable to hear the ticking of a watch held to his ear. When he came down he had regained about seventy per cent. of his hearing and was able to converse by telephone with his mother. He also said that when he started up he could not hear the motor, but that at a certain height it was suddenly audible.

This flight was held as a test for curing the deaf by altitude flights. Physicians said if Harris could go up 20,000 feet he would be able to hear perfectly.

WILL DRIVE SPOONERS FROM ARLINGTON CEMETERY

Washington, Sept. 12.—Public spooning has reached the limit when the spooners pick out Arlington Cemetery for their activities, army officers have decided. Upon protest of indignant residents adjacent to the cemetery, raids have been instituted to clear the roads around Arlington of midnight parties.

Robert Dye, superintendent of the cemetery, said that "thorough gamblers" had even spread their blankets on the cemetery walls, and that scores of automobiles parked beside the enclosure every night while a stone's throw of the graves of American soldiers. They will be kept moving hereafter, he said.
