ALL SEVEN BALL PLAYERS FREED BY THE JURY

(Canadian Press Despatch)

Chicago, Aug. 2.—The seven former Chicago White Sox baseball players and two others on trial for alleged conspiracy to defraud the public through throwing of the 1919 world series games were found not guilty by a jury tonight.

The verdict was reached after two hours and forty-seven minutes of deliberation, but was not returned until forty minutes later, Judge Hugo M. Friend being out of court when the decision was reached.

The defendants were: Oscar Buck Weaver, third baseman; Oscar Felsch, outfielder; Charles Risher, shortstop; Arnold ("Chick") Gandil, first baseman; Claude Williams and Edie Ciolette, pitchers; Joe Jackson, outfielder—all former White Sox players—and Carl Zerk, of St. Louis, and David Zelev, of Des Moines.

Judge Friend congratulated the jury, saying he thought it a just verdict.

U. S. REPRESENTED.
Washington, Aug. 2.—The United States is to be represented officially on the reparations commission, it was announced today on high authority. This is expected to be a development of the treaty that Secretary of State Hughes is now working out between the United States and Germany.

THE W. C. T. U.
The coming referendum on the prohibition of importation of liquor, was much spoken of at the meeting of the W. C. T. U. yesterday afternoon. An impressive address on the importance and helpfulness of the noon-tide prayer hour was given particular emphasis in that members were asked to bear in mind the aid a noon-tide prayer hour could give as the time of the referendum drew near.

As the first of the month, Mrs. Thompson led the devotional exercises. She read the first chapter of Isaiah and spoke with fine feeling of the text "Fear not, I am with thee." Mrs. David Hippwell, the president, was in the chair for the business session. Mrs. Berglund, the corresponding secretary, read a letter of thanks received from Miss Barnes. ORDER TO SKIPPERS.

Must Submit Names of Aliens in Crew to U. S. Consuls.

Washington, Aug. 2.—Masters of vessels of all nationalities sailing for a port of the United States of any of its possessions, except the Panama Canal zone, under an executive order must submit for a visa a list of all of the alien members of the vessel's crew to the United States consular officer at the port where the voyage begins. Alien seamen who arrived at United States ports and whose names are not included on the vessel list will not be allowed to land.

HUNGARY TO REORGANIZE GRAND NATIONAL CHAMBER.

Budapest, July 21.—The Hungarian government will soon introduce a law for the reorganization of membership of the grand national chamber. The chamber will be composed of parties representing the various cities and industrial, commercial and cultural associations.

The members of the nobility also will be represented. Another party will be representative of the clergy, members of the government and judiciary. There also will be twenty life members to be appointed by the king on the suggestion of the prime minister.

EMIGRANT CAMP AT SOUTHAMPTON, ENGLAND.

Southampton, Eng., July 22.—(Associated Press by Mail)—Atlantic Park, an estate near here, which was formerly used by the American army for flying purposes, has been acquired by the North Atlantic Conference, the chief members of which are the Cunard, the White Star and the Canadian Pacific Railroad Companies, as a permanent camp for emigrants sailing by their steamers to America.

Two of the aerodromes in the camp have already been converted to accommodate 2,500 people. With other buildings, it is estimated that nearly 6,000 continental emigrants will be lodged there during their short stay before sailing.
