

## Sensational Novelty in New Opera House Programme



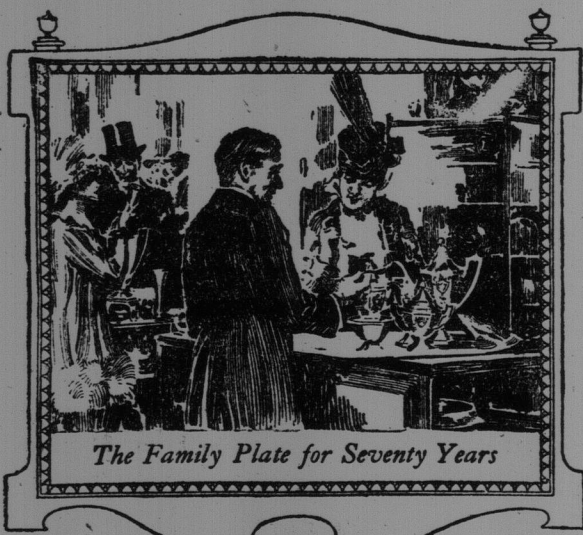
The bullet proof lady, a sensational sharp shooting novelty, one of the good features of a splendid vaudeville programme at the Opera House tonight.

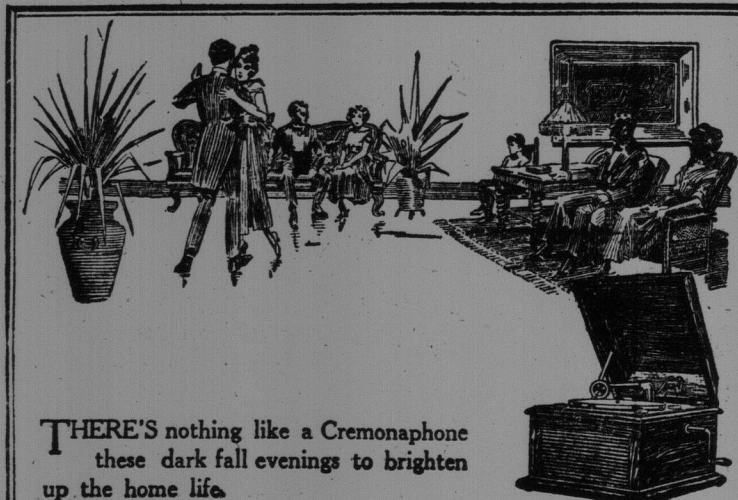

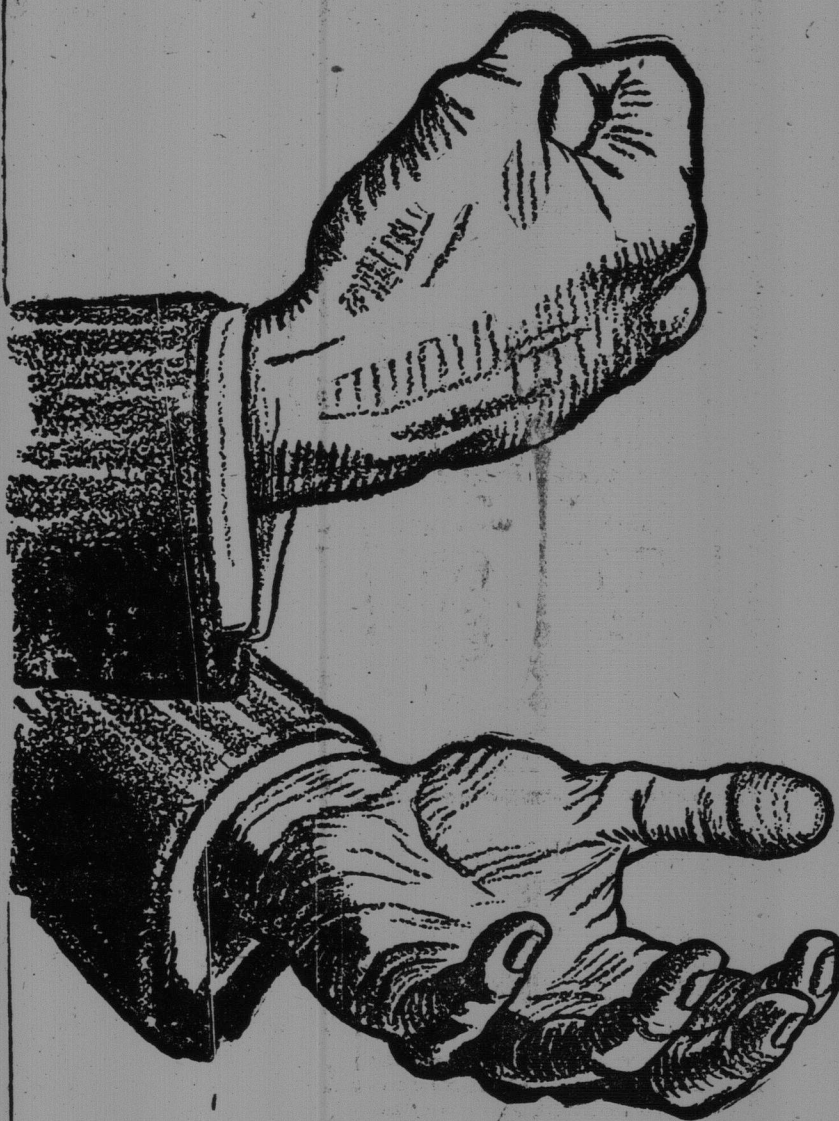
