Garfield White has purchased a lot near the Knoll and will erect a handsome residence here next summer.  
The Royal Bank of Canada opened its doors for business on Monday last.  
Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Aberton have taken possession of their new home on Church street.

It is understood that George Hoyt will build a handsome residence in Sussex next summer.

Reports from the big lumber camps indicate that good progress is being made with the season's cut. In some of the limits large numbers of logs are already ready for handling.

Another subdivision of real estate is on in Sussex. The property is centrally located and has been laid off with streets, etc. This makes the future property sale untroubled in the town within the past few months.

It is understood that the firm of C. T. White & Son will have their head office at Sussex in the near future. There several extensive lumber properties at East Apple River, Alma, Point Wolfe and West River will be administered from this central point. In connection with the change Harry Reid, formerly of the Simms Bros. Company, St. John, will accept a position with the firm and will become a permanent resident of Sussex.

## Cultivate a Lovely Mouth

ARE you the fault-finding or bad-tempered woman? If you are, then don't rely upon your mouth to keep your secret, as it is a great talker. Any malicious thought stamps itself immediately upon the lips, so that all who look may read the character of your thoughts. Since there is simply no getting away from the fact that the mouth is a talker, don't you think it would be wise, henceforth, to think only of pleasant things? It seems to me this is the best way out of this particular trouble. Of course it may be more than a trifle difficult to keep always serene, but I am sure if you try hard enough, the result will record nothing but pleasant thoughts. After you have succeeded in giving your lips nothing to report about, it is time to see if they have fallen heir to that beauty fault—a rough skin. If, upon looking in your mirror, you find that your lips are cracked and dry, hasten to seize upon a cream pot and treat them to a coat of its soothing contents. When five minutes have been consumed in massaging the roughened lips with this cream, you can call a halt. This beauty treatment, if persisted with for two or three days, will result in your lips becoming as smooth and soft as you could wish. Formula for a cream that is warranted to reduce cracked lips to submission—and that within a reasonable length of time—is given below, and I think it will prove a "friend in need" this coming winter.

## Lip Lip Cream

White wax..... 1/4 ounce  
Glycerine..... 1/4 ounce  
Sweet Oil..... 1 ounce  
Lip-water..... 1 ounce  
Tincture of Benzoin..... 1/4 dram

## Daily Hints For the Cook

**BAKED APPLES**  
Select large, tart apples. Wash and wipe dry. Remove the centres with an apple corer. Arrange them in a pan, with a very little water, filling the centres with sugar. Dip the sirup over them two or three times while baking. Serve warm with cream. These may be made more delicate by parting the apples and baking in an earthen pudding dish, filling the centres with sugar, chopped raisins and nuts, a piece of butter and a little lemon juice.

**MINCE MEAT**  
Five cups chopped meat, 3 cups chopped suet, 15 cups chopped apple, 7/8 cup light brown sugar, 10 teaspoons salt, 3 teaspoons cassia, 2 1/2 teaspoons clove, 2 1/2 teaspoons mace, 1 1/2 cups molasses, 2 pounds raisins, 1 pound currants, 1/2 pound citron, chopped fine, 1/4 pound chopped lemon peel.  
Mix with water in which the meat has been boiled, also cold tea. Boil all together about 1 hour and serve while hot in glass jars. Store in a cool place. When making pies add a few drops ext. lemon to each pie.

## SALVATION ARMY

## READY TO ASSIST

"Gangster Squad" to be Specially Trained to Help New York Police—Methods of Army Will be Different

New York, Nov. 29.—The Salvation Army has offered to help New York police in the lower East Side. "Blood and Fire" soldiers believe that the best way to handle the roughs who have terrorized New York better than the guardians of the peace, who work with "billy" and revolver. They have always claimed to understand the criminal classes, and are going to teach the police how to handle them. The New Training School, which is being erected here as a memorial to the late General Booth, will have a special department, a sort of post-graduate course where workers who have qualified in every other department will be given the very best methods by which a rough or a gangster from the slums may be brought to see the error of his ways.

Colonel Cox, editor of the "War Cry" and one of the chief promoters of the new training school, when seen at the Salvation Army headquarters in West Forty-fourth street, said:

**Violence Useless**  
"We think it has been proven that violence provides only violence. Throwing a Gyp the blood will electrocute, and he laughs; follow a Lefty Louie around the corner with a gun, and he is a devoted follower of the gang. The only way to handle these men is to win them by the use of the mind, and you will find that nine Leftys out of ten will yield to such influence. By the time they discover that their comrades are a Salvationist, they may, perhaps be ready to welcome the news. It will take, of course, the most skilled and efficient settlement workers in the world to perform such a rare service for a community."

"In our new training school we will sift out from all the country the most naturally gifted social workers and from them, in turn will be selected the people for this most difficult work. The training school will be the first one in the world to have separate classes for the different kinds of work and to use the individualities of the workers with special reference to the classes of society or the types of humanity with which they will be concerned."

"As a proof that the gangster and the gunman and the desperate character can be touched, just look at the friendship existing among these people; at the devotion of their wives and mothers and at the real courage and good nature with which they face the electric chair and the gallows. The fact that they have committed capital crimes and that they have been known to be cruel and vicious at certain times, is a state of things with which the state must deal, but the Gangster Squad, which the Salvation Army intends to turn out, will approach the difficulty from another angle; not that of the innate depravity which does most actually exist, but that of innate good feeling which does also most actively exist positively in the worst of human beings."

## BY-ELECTION WORK

## IN LONDON "TRUTH"

Instances of Desperate Tory Methods Resorted to Win Macdonald

(Times Correspondence)  
London, Nov. 19.—Palatable and unpalatable are the items published by "Truth" from week to week; and the following item, dealing with the by-election in Macdonald, Manitoba, was sent by a correspondent in Winnipeg:

"The aftermath of this election is showing the most corrupt electioneering methods ever employed in Canada. Roughly canvassers were arrested and thrown into jail without any charge against them, and were released only when the election was over. Two protection rackets were captured by the reciprocity scrutineers and put in jail, but a Tory magistrate let them out on bail within three hours on their own bond of \$250 each."

"The trial was fixed for a certain date, but another Tory magistrate held the trial at a secret session before the appointed time and without notifying the prosecution. Both persons pleaded guilty, and were fined \$20, although the election act provides without option for a jail sentence. This will give some idea of the desperate methods used in the Macdonald by-election."

## PRINCIPAL LLOYD'S APPEAL FOR CHURCH HELP IN ENGLAND

(Times Special Correspondence)  
London, Nov. 19.—Principal Lloyd of Saskatoon continues his energetic campaign for the church in Canada. Addressing a crowded gathering at the autumn meeting of the Colonial & Continental Church Society on the needs of Canada, he appealed to the people of the Old Country not to give \$25,000 to a home for cats and dogs, as was done by someone recently, but to contribute to the society for the prevention of cruelty to bishops—particularly the one bishop, who had had 800 square miles added to his diocese in one month.

He added that he regarded as of enormous importance what was done for Canada in the next ten years. Canada was the next nation at the moment. Earl Grey recently said "that the centre of gravity of the empire was shifting, and that the leader of the British nations in the future would be Canada."

It behooved them to go down on their knees and pray for the future of the empire.
