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ROYAL SWEEPSTAKES ON THE DERBY FELL THROUGH THIS YEAR

King and Queen Declined Betting Tickets and Most of Party Followed Example

London, June 5.—Queen Mary's well-known strong antipathy to gambling in any form was well demonstrated at this year's Derby, when the usual Derby sweepstakes among members of the royal household was not held. The reason for this was that the king and queen declined to take tickets on the result of the great race. All but a few members of the household followed the example of the king and queen, and as a result the pool fell through.

This sweepstakes was instituted in the year of the late King Edward's succession, and has been held ever since until yesterday. Last year it was won by the Duchess of Devonshire, who is now one of the queen's strongest supporters in her anti-gambling crusade. Queen Mother Alexandra won it once, but King Edward VII never had the right ticket. The tickets cost \$5.25 each and the first prize was generally about \$500.

AUTO POLO

Dangerous Sport for National Grounds Montreal

Montrealers will very soon have an opportunity of witnessing that intensely thrilling game, properly known as auto-polo. Practically all arrangements have now been completed for the holding of several of these exciting exhibitions there. The contest will very likely be held towards the end of June, when the best American players will perform in an acropolis and relegate the most exciting horse polo game to something of the past. The game is played with either four or two cars on a side, each car containing two men, a driver and a "maneuver." The game is played with an air filled ball, eight inches in diameter and the regulation polo mallet, and is governed by the same rules as ordinary polo.

However, it is by far more exciting than the ordinary game where the

phillets showed a profit of \$27,428 for the year ended July 31, 1912, as against a loss of \$10,822 for the previous year, according to the report of Graduate Manager Garcelon, made public on Tuesday night. Football is the chief money making sport of the university, the receipts being \$12,179, and the expenses \$23,224. Other principal sport receipts and expenses follow: Baseball, receipts \$17,501; expenses, \$18,974; boat club, receipts \$3,422; expenses, \$16,884; track, receipts \$2,427; expenses, \$10,427; hockey, receipts \$2,857; expenses, \$2,628; association football, no receipts, expenses \$1,702.

Houlton, June 4.—The Saturday afternoon matinee races will be begun on June 7, and will continue each Saturday until further notice.

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
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GOOD RESOLUTIONS
