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## ROYAL SWEEPSTAKES

ON THE DERBY FELL

THROUGH THIS YEAR

King and Queen Declined Betting

Tickets and Most of Party Followed Example

London, June 5.—Queen Mary's well-known strong antipathy to gambling in any form was well demonstrated at this year's Derby, when the usual Derby sweepstakes among members of the royal household was not held. The reason for this was that the king and queen declined to take tickets on the result of the great race. All but a few members of the household followed the example of the king and queen, and as a result the pool fell through.

This sweepstakes was instituted in the year of the late King Edward's succession, and has been held every year since until yesterday. Last year it was won by the Duchess of Devonshire, who is now one of the queen's strongest supporters in her anti-gambling crusade. Queen Mother Alexandra won it once, but King Edward VII never had the right ticket. The tickets cost \$2.50 each and the first prize was generally about \$500.
