### FAIRVILLE MAN MISSING SINCE LAST TUESDAY

Police Seek Trace of T. Hanford Reed—Last Seen in Water Street

A matter that is engaging the attention of the police authorities just at present is the disappearance of T. Hanford Reed, son of Thomas Reed, of Prospect street, Fairville, who has been missing from his home since last Tuesday. He was engaged with his father in the coal business in Fairville, and on Tuesday afternoon last he came to the city to look after some business. The last seen of him was at four o'clock that afternoon, when he was seen in company with a man named White standing at the corner of Water and Princess streets. Since then all trace of him has been lost.

White told the police that Reed had taken a drink. He had not said anything of going away. When Reed left home he had but \$2.80 in his possession, having given his mother \$17.50 before going to town. He had not been in the habit of staying away from home, and his parents are at an utter loss to know what could have happened to him.

The missing man is thirty-seven years of age, about five feet ten inches in height and has a sandy mustache. At the time of his disappearance he wore a dark blue suit and a hat. He did not wear any overcoat. The only police clue at present is that he may have fallen over one of the wharves off Water street. As far as is known, he had no reason to leave home, and if he had intended leaving the town he would have taken money with him.

A diligent search is being made for trace of him. Both Mr. and Mrs. Reed are naturally grief-stricken over the affair and would gladly welcome any news of their missing son.

### HAMPTON TRAIN MIGHT HAVE BEEN WRECKED BY BOY

Eight Year Old John Mitchell Opened Switch at Rothersey—Is in Court With Two Others

According to the evidence given in the police court this morning in the case of Cecil Livingstone, aged twelve, Richard Sullivan, aged ten, and John Mitchell, aged eight, all charged with trespassing on the C. B. property and also with tampering with a switch at Rothersey on Thursday last, passengers on the incoming suburban train from Hampton on that day, they played truant from school on that day and went to Rothersey to spend the day.

They proceeded by way of the I. C. R. tracks, and on reaching Rothersey, Mitchell took hold of the switch, which happened to be unlocked, and opened it. The other boys, it was said, warned him to leave it alone, but to no avail. This happened between half-past one and two o'clock that day, and the train was delayed there in about ten minutes.

Had it not been that City Thompson, an employee of the station agent at Rothersey happened to be walking along the track attending to the lamps, and fortunately came across the open switch, the train would likely run right into it and be wrecked.

The boys were all in court this morning and pleaded guilty to walking on the track. Livingstone and Sullivan both said it was Mitchell who turned the switch. Young Mitchell admitted that it was he, but said that he thought he left the switch the way he found it. All three admitted playing truant on that day at Mitchell's suggestion, as they thought the more going to be taken to court for annoying a milkman.

Nine prisoners, all charged with drunkenness were arrested by the police on Saturday and Sunday. Seven were arraigned in the police court this morning, two having been allowed out on deposit.
