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Appointment of Montreal Man to High Office Announced. With G. T. R. Since 1888—To Have Charge of Sleeping, Dining, Parlor Car and Hotel Departments.

The appointment of John Edward Dalrymple as vice-president of the Canadian National Railways in charge of traffic, hotels, sleeping cars and dining cars, at once puts Mr. Dalrymple in one of the most important executive positions in the world. His appointment had been expected in railway circles here for several days, especially as the Grand Trunk, where Mr. Dalrymple's fitness for the position was naturally best known.

It was confirmed with characteristic brevity by Mr. Dalrymple yesterday afternoon, when he said he understood the order was being issued. "It is a big contract that has been put on me," said Mr. Dalrymple to The Gazette. "It means very great responsibility, and a great deal of work. All I can say about it is that I accept the responsibility and shall do the work, and hope that I shall make good."

Mr. Dalrymple is a remarkable instance of the one institution man. He started his life career in the service of the Grand Trunk, and has stayed with it ever since. Starting as a junior clerk in the office of the treasurer at headquarters here, in 1883, he has worked his way steadily forward, and undertaken work in many departments of the system, always with such results that he was moved forward to higher positions and greater responsibilities. He was given his great start by the late Charles M. Hays, who had a reputation for wise selection of men to work with him, and since that time he has made his own progress more rapid. Among other responsible positions he has held are those of secretary and general manager of the Grand Trunk Railway System at Montreal, during the three years ending in May, 1899; division freight agent of the Grand Trunk, August, 1899, to May, 1900; general freight agent of the Central Vermont Railway at St. Albans, Vt., from May, 1900, to March, 1901; assistant to the second vice-president and general manager of the Grand Trunk System, from March, 1901 to April, 1902; general freight agent of the Central Vermont Railway from April, 1902

at the Montreal headquarters. As to this, and other changes incidental to his appointment, announcements will be made later. A Montreal Born. John Edward Dalrymple was born January 1, 1869, in the City of Montreal. Through the paternal line he is descended from the ancient Scottish family of Dalrymple, and through the maternal family is of Irish descent. Educated in the public schools of his native city, Mr. Dalrymple entered the railway service in his early youth. His first position, taken July 1, 1883, was that of a junior clerk in the treasurer's office of the Grand Trunk Railway. In April, 1890, he was made secretary to the freight traffic manager of the Chicago and Grand Trunk Railway, at Chicago, continuing in that capacity until February, 1896. From that time dated his general traffic manager of the Grand Trunk Railway System at Montreal, during the three years ending in May, 1899; division freight agent of the Grand Trunk, August, 1899, to May, 1900; general freight agent of the Central Vermont Railway at St. Albans, Vt., from May, 1900, to March, 1901; assistant to the second vice-president and general manager of the Grand Trunk System, from March, 1901 to April, 1902; general freight agent of the Central Vermont Railway from April, 1902

to August 13, 1905, and general freight agent of the Grand Trunk Railway System during the three following years. In May, 1908, he went to Winnipeg, Man., as assistant freight traffic manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway and Steamships. In October, 1911, he was made vice-president in charge of traffic of the Grand Trunk, Grand Trunk Pacific, Central Vermont, Grand Trunk Pacific Coast Steamship Company and other subsidiaries of the Grand Trunk system. In this office he has since continued, an influential factor in the operations of the Grand Trunk lines. Mr. Dalrymple is a member of the St. James, Montreal, and St. George's Snowshoe Clubs of Montreal, and of the Manitoba Club of Winnipeg.

TAKE UP RULE OF ROAD ON TUESDAY. (Canadian Press Despatch). Halifax, N. S., March 2.—Hon. William Chisholm, minister of highways, gave notice in the House of Assembly at this afternoon's session that he would on Tuesday next introduce a bill amending the Rule of the Road Act and the Motor Vehicle Act. Premier Armstrong introduced two bills amending the Trust Companies' Act and the Loan Companies' Act, to make them conform with the federal loan and trust companies' acts, also a bill providing a committee to regulate the employment of pages, messengers and other attendants of the local House.


