Boston, Dec. 3—Twenty-five men were killed in a fire which swept through the upper floors of the Arcadia Hotel, a cheap men's lodging house in the south end, early today. Others are missing and scores were taken to hospitals suf-fering from burns and injuries received in jumping from Windows. Nearly all the bodies were terribly burned and mutilated, making identi-fleation almost impossible. The victims were men in poor circumstances, who had resorted to the place for a night's lodging. Many of them were negroes. Gaught in the zerowded bunks on the top floor of the five story brick building, and in the small rooms on the fourth floor they were helpless. When they were aroused, the stairways were in flames and there was a mad rush for the fire accases at the rear. Practically all the men were naked. 
