SIR SALAR JUNG DEAD.

Formerly Prime Minister of the Nizam of Hyderabad.

London, July 15.—Sir Salar Jung, formerly prime minister of the Nizam of Hyderabad, is dead.

Sir Salar Jung was the son of the great Hindu statesman of the same name, who, as prime minister of Hyderabad, showed himself one of the ablest native administrators in India. The father died in 1883, the son succeeded to the office of prime minister, and was confirmed in the office of the installation of the young Nizam, but having advised an investment in mining shares, by which the Nizam lost heavily, he became unpopular at court, and had to retire from the office of prime minister, in which he was succeeded by Sir Asman Jah. The Nizam, however, granted him a liberal retiring pension, and undertook to pay the debts left by his father, amounting to \$100,000.
