He does not expect the yield to be half what it was last year, while in some cases the crop will be entirely lost.

Essex.—From Essex the report is that there is considerable increase in the area sown—same reports estimate this as high as 30 per cent. The reports as to appearance are very discouraging and the estimate of yield is placed at about 12 bushels to the acre.

"I had seven acres of wheat," says one correspondent, "and it is no good. Another man on the other side of the road Tad 50 acres and only 15 will be worth leaving. Other fields will have to be worked up. I do not think that what is left will average over ten bushels to the acre.

Another correspondent says the crop has suffered badly from frost; that sown early seems to lave sustained the getting in good shape and spring seed.
