STEAMER AT BOSTON.

HALIFAX, N. S., July 11.—Today the steamer Boston met with a serious accident in her long career. While running in for Yarmouth she struck on Southwest Point, West Cape, where she remained for fifteen minutes. She had 240 passengers, and the boats were at once cut loose ready for launching. There was a dense fog and Capt. Stanwood had been sounding for some time when he made the fog whistle and started ahead. In a few minutes the Boston brought up with a crash. A boat was put over the side and the second officer sent ashore for assistance, but before he could return the Boston backed off with her own steam and arrived in time to make train connections. Twenty of her plates and stem are carried away and her collision bulkhead is full of water.

FREDERICTON NEWS.

FREDERICTON, July 11.—The prisoners, Howard, Williams and Grant, with their counsel, H. F. McLeod, appeared before His Honor Judge Wilson at 3 o'clock this afternoon and said they had elected to be tried by jury. They were accordingly remanded. This means that under the present decision their trial will not take place until October as the county court does not meet till then. Under the Speedy Trials Act they have the power to elect with the consent of the prosecuting attorney. Mr. McLeod told the court that in all probability they would be released, in fact he was quite sure of it. They would not apply for bail. The men on their appearance today looked in the best of condition and do not appear to have suffered to any great extent from their confinement. If it were not for the handcuffs they wear while on the street, they might be taken for American millionaires or a tourist party.

GOSS-HUTCHINGS CASE SETTLED.

The Goss-Hutchings case has been amicably settled by Miss Patricia Hutchings departing for her home in Newfoundland with her child yesterday. A. W. Baird and Edmund S. Ritchie came to an agreement and Miss Hutchings announced herself as willing to return home if she could have custody of the child she had in court with her. Goss also was willing to return to his family. In pursuance of this agreement Miss Hutchings left last night with her child for Newfoundland and as soon as a telegram is received here announcing her arrival, Goss will be allowed to proceed home with his wife to the States.

ALL QUIET AT SYDNEY.

HALIFAX, N. S., July 11.—The Canadian militia have been relieved of duty at Sydney and the last of them will leave for home in the morning. The places of the relieved troops are being taken by a company of the C. R. of Quebec, who arrived in Sydney tonight. When the Halifax detachment march out tomorrow morning their posts will be taken by the C. R., who will remain until the strike is settled one way or another. The strike situation shows little change. The P. W. A. claim that there are fewer men on the plant than before the arrival of the troops, that there are less skilled men, and that only eight P. W. A. men out of 1,500 are engaged. The union say they do not care how many laborers go to work so long as the works are kept from operation. The company, on the other

hand, say that they do not require more skilled men, and that as soon as everything is in readiness they will start the rod and wire mills, the blooming mill being already in operation. One open hearth furnace will be re-lighted. In consequence of heavy rain today the fires which during the past two weeks have been devastating thousands of acres of land through the districts surrounding Sydney, have been extinguished. The losses sustained to lumber lands and property reach in the vicinity of two hundred thousand dollars.
