There are indications that Bulgaria may enter into Constantinople. According to some reports Bulgaria will be content with finding suitable winter quarters for her army while the peace negotiations are going on and subsequent settlements are being arranged.

While it is stated that the exact reasons for ordering a suspension of work on the Southern New England line are not known to President Mellen, it is admitted that negotiations are under way, and have been for some time, looking to a joint use of the New Haven lines by the New Haven and Grand Trunk roads.

There is still talk in Vienna of a local newspaper, the Sonn und Montag Zeitung, sums up the position of the Austro-Hungarian Empire in the Balkan question in the following four points.

First—Assured and unrestricted facilities for access to the eastern markets, as well as yesterday's conference between Dr. S. Danef, the president of the Bulgarian chamber of deputies, and Count von Berchtold, and subsequently with the German ambassador in Vienna.

That Mr. Mellen has been in various times in communication with Mr. Chamberlain and thinks it probable that an agreement as to traffic will also be made, but that there has been no understanding expressed of any kind with regard to the Southern New England extension, and if the Grand Trunk has discontinued its work, as stated in the newspapers, it was because the Grand Trunk believed from its own standpoint, and not self and the New Haven road.
