Reports Presented at Monthly Meeting on Monday—Conservation Committee—Socks Continue to Be a Most Pressing Need—The Many Activities of the Red Cross.

The returns from the workers rather than the number of members present at the regular monthly meeting of the Local Red Cross Branch, held on Monday afternoon in the rooms on Chipman Hill, were the evidences that summer weather does not prevent the carrying out of the work for the sick and wounded in the war areas. The president, Mrs. John McAvity, was in the chair; minutes of previous meeting read by Miss Edith Skinner, who, in the much regretted absence of the secretary, Miss Alice Walker, is carrying out her duties. The most important matters before the meeting were the report from the Conservation Committee which, under the efficient chairmanship of Miss Frances Stetson, has now been at work a little over a year; and a report from the Committee of the Canadian War Contingent Association. Miss Stetson, for the Conservation Committee, reviewed the work of the year; in that time the committee have established the conservation boxes about the city; they have formed a business connection with buyers and have a baling and collecting centre as well as several branches where collectors call for papers, magazines and so on. A serious difficulty has been to establish effective co-operation in the interest of the work throughout the city generally so that the expenses connected with it might be lessened. The committee have not been able to do this as closely as was hoped, but feel that the groundwork for future success has been laid. The initial expense was heavy, and the work itself has been also heavy, but after paying its bills, the committee retire with over three hundred dollars to its credit as well as several cartloads of paper in waiting for shipment; it has its plant and has, in the opinion of its members, established the fact that some profit for the society lies this way of business. Miss Stetson, who was holding a great deal of individual effort into this enterprise, will be out of the city for a few months, and retired office, although retaining a valuable member of the committee, with the new year, new committees will be formed and if possible the work will continue.

Mrs. George K. MacLeod, convenor of the C. W. C. A., said that while in Toronto she talked with Mrs. Plimpre about the needs for this branch of the Red Cross work and was assured that one of the most pressing needs was socks. Yarn may be obtained for this work from Mrs. MacLeod at the rooms occupied by the C. W. C. A. on Chipman Hill. The committee have now on hand about \$175.00, and from this it was suggested that \$100.00 be forwarded to headquarters to be used for any need for the men at the front. This money was given expressly for the use of the men in action and is a separate fund from all other Red Cross money. It was decided to send \$100.00 for this purpose. In connection with the sock question the following extracts from a letter from a soldier, Capt. Gerald Anglin, to his mother, were read:

"In your letter, mother, of March 11th you ask my version of the sock question.

"Thanks to the mothers at home who are continually knitting, the men lack nothing in the line of socks. These come to the battalion quarters, masters from the Women's Comforts, and the men get a pair any time they need them. I met a new draft chap just coming out of a French shop the other day and he was holding a pair of socks up and telling his chums to look at what he had to pay three francs for. Of course, he didn't know any better, but I guess he won't be so foolish again. I sent him in and he got his money back, and then sent him to the G. M. store where he got two better pairs for nothing.

"I could take an oath that all my men here at least have a pair of socks. They are fine for around billets when I am wearing slacks, but for every-day wear they are too thin, and you know the way my feet harden up on the soles if the socks are not heavy enough."

"Mrs. H. White, for the Needlework reported that altogether 2,944 articles had been received during July, this included large donations of snap from Mrs. Burden. The returns of finished work were very satisfactory. Among the articles were 644 pyjama suits, 21 hospital shirts, 1179 towels, 728 bed socks, 429 binders, 13 filled comfort bags, 136 knitted face cloths. The expense in this department, in which for this month the expenses of the surgical department are also included, amount to \$778.13. Workers are reminded that it is now question of the hospital. The increased cost in all kinds of materials makes it imperative that the greatest care and economy be exercised by all circles and individual workers. From suggestions made by the nurses who have been at home it was decided to pair the making of hospital shirts both from flannel and from cotton, also to make many knitted bandages. Logville, Aug. 6.—Wilson Manderson's many friends are sorry to learn of his recent injuries. In jumping from the train while it was running he hurt his head and knee. He has since been confined to the house, but is steadily improving.

His father, A. F. Manderson, fell from a roof building recently and was considerably hurt, but is able to be out again.

Mr. A. C. Skelton, the treasurer, presented his monthly report to the president in which he stated that the balance at the credit of the Red Cross Society account to date is \$4,297.34. This includes the sum of \$4,000, received from the municipality of the City and County of St. John, which was raised by way of taxation.

The result of the entertainment held in the Imperial Theatre for the benefit of the Red Cross Society, which was held on the 1st of September, was a success. The sum of \$502.55, which was duly handed to me by Mrs. Vroom together with a detailed statement as to how this amount was made up. The sum of \$55 was added to this from special subscriptions given to Miss Walker. So that the total amount remitted to Lady Tilly for the French Red Cross was \$558.05.

Mr. P. P. Starr on behalf of his firm has donated five tons of coal for the Red Cross building, which, in view of the present price of coal, is a very generous gift. I am in hopes that additional coal will be donated by other dealers.

In order that the free occupancy of the building by the Red Cross Society may not be overlooked, the Bank of British North America will, in future, make a rental charge for the use of the building, but in the meantime this charge will be returned by the bank to the Red Cross Society. This rental had better be at the rate of \$600 per annum payable quarterly, commencing on the 1st of September next. This arrangement will not cost the Red Cross anything but for purposes of record it is considered a better plan, and perhaps it is just as well for the Red Cross Society to feel that they are under an obligation to pay rent, and it will also give a clear idea of the cost of operating expenses of the Society in St. John.
