Athletic Meet

If he averaged 70 to 80 per cent. he receives a white Honor Badge; 80 to 90 per cent. a Blue Honor, and 90 to 100 per cent. a Red Honor.

Jewtraw Middle
Atlantic Champion

Decision Given at Meeting of Delegates to International Skating Union of America.

Lake Placid, Feb. 12.—When Chas. Jewtraw, of Lake Placid, appeared here today for the final struggle for the international championship he was hailed for the first time as middle Atlantic champion.

At the close of deliberations by the delegates to the annual meeting of the International Skating Union of America, Allan I. Blanchard, the newly elected president, announced that the complications arising over the holding of the so-called United States Championships at Newburgh on New Year's Day and re-creating them again at Saranac Lake recently had been officially adjusted, and that the Newburgh meeting instead of being a national meet as announced at the time was in reality the first middle Atlantic meet, being the first held under the auspices of that organization. He stated that this decision on the part of the International Association automatically makes Jewtraw middle Atlantic champion, which he recently won at Saranac Lake.

Amateur Ice
Skating Records

Gorman Holds 440 Yards Outdoor Record—McGowan and McLean on Indoor.

For the past couple of weeks there has been considerable talk regarding speed skating records and especially since Charlie Gorman made his 440 outdoor world's record at Lake Placid on Friday last.

The following amateur ice skating records were compiled by John B. Foster for Spalding's and it may be mentioned that the 240 yards record made by Everett McGowan and Robert McLean, which equal that of Gorman, 37 3/5 seconds, were made on indoor tracks. Faster time than this was made by Harley Davidson, and J. F. Donohoe, but these were with the wind and flying starts. Gorman certainly holds the world's outdoor record.

JOE MOORE WON INTERNATIONAL
TITLE AT LAKE PLACID MEET

McWhirter Captured Three Mile Race in 8 Minutes and 45 Seconds, Making World's Record—Gorman and Steinmetz Disqualified for Fouling.

Lake Placid, N. Y., Feb. 12.—Miss Gladys Robinson, of Toronto, won the women's international skating championship at the championship meet which closed here yesterday. Miss Robinson wrestled the title from Rose Johnson, of Chicago. She took second place to Miss Johnson in the 220 yard dash and won the mile for women, giving her a grand total of 170 points. Miss Johnson had 130; Mildred Trustler, of Brooklyn, 30; Miss Edna Webster, Toronto, 20, and Miss O. Barth, of Brooklyn, 10.

Joe Moore, of New York City, won the men's international title with a total of 160 points. Charles Jewtraw, of Lake Placid, who recently won the United States title, second with 80 points, and Roy McWhirter, of Chicago, third with sixty points.

New World's Record.
McWhirter set a new world's amateur record in winning the three mile event yesterday in eight minutes, forty-five seconds. This was three and two-fifths of a second faster than the former record made by John Nilsson at Montreal in 1896. A "trick" was declared by some of the skaters just before the three mile event, but it was called off before the record-breaking race began.

A wire received by The Standard late last night from Montreal was to the effect that it was unable to trace Gorman's whereabouts because at that time the Montreal skaters have not yet returned from Lake Placid.

Speaking of the situation last night, Frank White said he had not received any word from any of the skaters Saturday or Sunday, and as the Montreal men had not returned home last night, it is most probable that the St. John men are with them and will not arrive here before tomorrow afternoon.

Preparations are in hand to give the skaters a good reception when the Montreal train arrives, as well as a banquet tomorrow night.

Protests Received By Secretary Wade

One Refers to Veno Brink, on Chatham List; Other Over Brown Acting as Referee.

Fredericton, Feb. 13.—Clarence H. Wade, secretary of the New Brunswick Hockey League, has received from Sandy Staples of this city, who was referee of the game, two protests lodged by the Campbellton Hockey Club before the game which the Chatham and Campbellton clubs played at Campbellton on Wednesday, Feb. 10.

One protest refers to the presence of Stanley (Shorty) Veno in uniform with the Chatham team, to his having been included in the list of players given by the Chatham team for the game and was evidently filed to protect the Campbellton Club's amateur standing in the event of an ineligible player being used.

The other protest, over Frank M. Brown of Moncton acting as a referee in accordance with the Chatham Club's demands that they would not play unless he was on the ice, thus disregarding the appointment by the then president of the N. B. H. L. of Sandy Staples as the sole referee and in spite of the regulations of the league which say that an appointment of a referee by the league president shall not be subject to any appeal.

Secretary Wade is communicating with Chas. A. Alexander, secretary of the Campbellton Hockey Club, and will ask him to make a statement of the Campbellton Club's claims and if a sufficiently concise statement of facts is obtainable, copies will be submitted to every club and a mail vote will be taken on the protests in question. If a decision cannot be reached without doing so, a meeting of the executive will be called.

Representatives of Bathurst, Campbellton, Marysville and Fredericton Clubs have already unofficially declared that they will demand recognition by the Chatham Hockey Club of the acts of the officers of the league.

Several of the clubs are said to be determined to go through with such action, even if it results in the Chatham Club carrying out threats that have already been made to leave the N. B. H. L. and jump to the independents.

Chicago Boat Won At Miami, Fla.

The "Adieu" Defeated "Rainbow" of Hamilton, Ont., by Seconds in Fifty Mile Race.

Miami, Fla., Feb. 13.—By a scant three seconds, Adieu, owned and driven by Webb Jay, of Chicago, defeated Rainbow owned and driven by H. B. Greening of Hamilton, Ont., in a fifty mile race for open displacement boats under American power boat association sanction here yesterday and carried off the Carl C. Fisher \$5,000 gold trophy with 11 points for the meet, to the Rainbow's eight and Orla's six. Adieu's time was 1:19:50.

Miami, Fla., Feb. 13.—The contest for the Carl C. Fisher power boat trophy had narrowed down today to three boats. The Adieu, owned by Webb Jay, of Chicago, was leading with seven points; the Orla II, owned by George Leary, Jr., of New York, was second with six points; and the Rainbow, owned and driven by H. B. Greening, of Hamilton, Ont., was third with five points. Races are run under American power boat rules and possession of the trophy was up to day for decision.
