



Having made a success of farming in British Columbia and sold his holdings there at a good profit, S. Brentnall, an Englishman who was in the city yesterday, says that he will not return to the West, but if he returns to Canada he will try his luck in New Brunswick. Mr. Brentall arrived in the city for the purpose f taking passage on the C. P. R. steam-r Empress of Ireland which is to steam omorrow for Liverpool, but hearing of the great opportunities for taking up va-cant land in New Brunswick, he made some inquiries yesterday, and last evening discussed the prospects of securing a considerable quantity of land, with siderable quantity of land, with some prominent members of the board of trade. He said yesterday that he had been in touch with some friends in England who were thinking of coming to Canada to take up farming, and that if he were satisfied with the openings in New Bruns-wick he might be able to persuade them enter on an enterprise in this prov

When asked to discuss the relative merits of the east and west for agricul-tural prospects, Mr. Brentnall said that although he was in one of the most desir-able farming sections of British Columbia, the same extremes of heat and cold were experienced as in the east. It was absurd represent British Columbia as a land eternal summer, although it was true, course, that the temperature did not go own so low as forty below zero at any down so low as forty below zero at any time. Farm values were high in British Columbia and he thought it a great haz and for the newcomer to invest in farm land at \$1.000 an acre as it was a very lifficult task to make it pay at this rate. For the cultivated portion of his farm was paid at the rate of more than \$300 an acre and could not complain at all of he years spent in the Pacific province. Mr. Brentnall is a fine type of the old English free trader and he professes to see n the high cost of living and unnatural nditions in western cities the need for reer trade, or at least reciprocity, with the United States.

"One man's gas bill in his rooms, with only a few lights," he said, "amounted to \$27.50 a month, and this is accounted for the high wages which the company must ay to the men. If a single man could ive on \$15 a month for board and ladg-ng it would not be necessary to pay him \$65 to \$80 a month. "In the country districts," said Mr.

Brentnall, "reciprocity is still a very live issue, as the farmers must have a market for their increasing wheat product. One farmer alone has wheat spoiling in his field, either because their is no market or because the grain cannot be moved east and west fast

ough. "It looks to me," said Mr. Brantnall, "if little England with coal the only na-tural product which she exports, can find live trade profitable that Canada with unlimited natural resources would find it the best policy. If the manufacturer can make plows and sell them to the farmers. so much the better, but you or I should not be paying that manufacturer for carrying on his business. He should be able to look out for himself."
