

TORY MAJORITY CUT TO 300 IN MIDDLESEX

Glass Beat Fisher in Bye-Election

Conservatives in Last Contest Won By 601

Liberal Candidate Declares the Result is Largely Due to Work of Election "Thugs" and Cabinet Ministers—Bad Weather Prevented Many From Going to the Polls.

London, Ont., Oct. 21.—Alderman S. Frank Glass, of this city, was today elected to the house of commons from East Middlesex in succession to the late Peter Elson, M. P.

The Conservative candidate's majority over R. G. Fisher, Liberal, 608.

Of the 45 sub-divisions, all but 16 gave majorities for Glass. Eight of the remainder were in Westminster township, a Liberal stronghold, which on this occasion elected Mr. Fisher 112.

The vote was about 600 short of that polled in the riding in the general election of 1911, when Mr. Elson was given 681 majority. Rainy weather and bad roads handicapped the getting out of the vote.

Mr. Glass, in addressing a gathering at the committee rooms, explained his belief in the doctrine of protection for Canadian industries, and in Canadian aid to the imperial war.

Mr. Fisher in a statement after the result was known, expressed the opinion that the presence of cabinet ministers and election "thugs" in the riding contributed to the result.

FIVE HEAD OF CATTLE STARVED TO DEATH IN LUMBER CAMP

Fredericton, Oct. 21.—A startling discovery was made by Fred Aitken last week when he went to one of his father's camps on the Hawley Road, about five miles from this city.

Mr. Aitken had intended staying at the camp for the night and to go about the next day. When he reached the camp he found the door closed and could not enter. After a time he found five yearling cattle dead on the floor.

It appears the cattle had taken refuge in the camp to escape from the flies and in their movements about the room had closed the door. They were thus imprisoned without food and starved to death.

Just how long they were in the camp is hard to say, but it is believed they were there for several months.

The cattle belonged to Mr. Cunningham, of Hawley.

Coming Second Week in November

Norton-Griffiths Wants to Hurry Work at Courtenay Bay—Outlook Blue For More Steamer Berths in This City Because of Wanting Revente and Big Expenditures.

Ottawa, Oct. 21.—Next month St. John and Halifax will have the opportunity of placing their desires for public works before the Hon. Robert Rogers, who is the head of the dredging and wharf building department of the government. He and the Hon. G. D. Hazen have arranged a trip to the maritime provinces for the second week in November. St. John, Halifax and other eastern points, where public works are in progress, will be visited.

The application of St. John for ten additional steamer berths to be constructed in time for the winter export season of 1914-15, has rather staggered the Ottawa authorities. If the demand had been finally and firmly pressed last session, St. John might have succeeded in obtaining what its commerce requires, but this session money will be rather scarce and new works will be undertaken with great reluctance.

The revenues from customs and other sources, and beginning to feel the effect of the financial stringency and the showing in the monthly returns that the revenue of Canada at the close of the fiscal year will reveal a considerable shrinkage from the year before. The public debt is now certain to be increased as the result of the year's operations. The government has an extensive programme of construction in hand, including the new Welland Canal, the five-million driveway along the Toronto water front, the Hudson Bay Canal and the thirty-million-dollar works at Halifax.

These works have been commenced along with many others and must be carried on, and the addition of several millions at St. John will have a hard time to obtain the endorsement of a majority of the government. However, Hon. Mr. Rogers will not unlikely promise them, he has record of being a more competent promoter than performer.

Mr. Cochrane is back and will give his attention to the Intercolonial situation in due season.

CHANCE FOR FRAUD

Will Recommend Government to Change the Procedure of Summoning Panels—Cases Before the Carleton County Circuit Court.

He said: "We are 100 years behind the times in our manner of summoning and dealing with juries. The system of choosing by the sheriff lends itself to fraud, unless we have the very best kind of men for sheriffs. He called upon the attorney-general to remedy the defect."

Captain of British Vessel Reports Weird Discovery in Magellan Strait.

Punta Arenas is a pretty large place as South American towns go. It has a population of several thousands, and of course the Magellan Strait is a great highway traversed by hundreds of ships yearly, which take this way to avoid doubling the Horn with its furious gales.

Fore River Shipbuilding Company, Started Not Many Years Ago, is Able to Build in Competition With All the World of Work Here.

(The Outlook, New York, Oct. 11.)

The Argentine battleship Rivadavia has been completed by a firm in this country. The trial trips of the new vessel along the Maine coast have made marvellous showing, indicating that she can do much better than the twenty-two and a half knots called for by her contract.

In the opinion of some qualified observers, the Rivadavia is the most powerful battleship afloat. It is certainly a satisfaction that she has been built in the United States, and it is still greater satisfaction that an American firm got the contract in competition with the rest of the world. This was because its bid was the lowest.

English ship-builders in especial were much excited at the discovery that apparently they could not build ships as cheaply as we could, and one firm in England ascribed the reason to the existence, as it alleged, of "powerful rings" in this country, able to "control the supply of armor and armament."

The shipbuilding company above referred to is the Fore River Shipbuilding Company, of Quincy (Mass.), whose shipyard and plant, now employing about 4,000 men, were described by Hon. William Pakenham, British ambassador, in a naval question in the house of commons. The site of this enormous plant was an open field thirteen years ago.
